The information now being received by the government concerning the true condition of affairs in Cuba confirms what many have suspected, that the Cuban Junta has deceived the administration in regard to the strength of the insurgents on the island. The Cuban army is a myth. It is no army at all. There are no corps nor brigades. There are simply isolated bands, capable only of carrying on a guerrilla warfare. The Cuban Junta has been simply lying. Whatever fighting is done on the island will have to be done by United States troops. There is no insurgent army to help Uncle Sam. It would have been better to have kicked the Junta out of the country months ago. It is no more to be believed than the Spaniards themselves. More than this, the government has also discovered that the Spanish army in much stronger on the island than reported by the Cubans. Instead of the Spanish army in Cuba numbering only 30,000 men, they number nearer 100,000, and instead of being incapable soldiers and unwilling to fight the United States, they are ready for the conflict and able to make a stubborn resistance. In the light of these facts, the army of invasion will find it no light task to subdue the island. There is stern business ahead for the boys now on their way to Cuba. It is worse than useless to underestimate the task cut out for them. Now that the government fully understands the situation, it should throw a great force of sufficient strength into Cuba, and, in the meantime, should rid the country of the lying representatives of the island now in New York and Washington.

CLATSOP COUNTY'S HONOR.

Amongst all the figures in the political arena, none rapidly taking on a very lively aspect, none is more conspicuous than that of F. L. Dunbar, the republican candidate for secretary of state. A gentleman of polished demeanor under all circumstances, he knows how to meet friends and foes, and his manner has won him new friends wherever he has visited during the campaign.

It is with pride that old Clatsop county can point to its representative on the state ticket, nominated for one of the most important offices within the gift of the people of the state. Judging from Mr. Dunbar's past record as county clerk for many years, the affairs of the secretary of state's office will be kept in perfect order, and by up-to-date methods. He is young, progressive, believes in modern ideas and system and is ambitious to excel in the conduct of all business affairs under his jurisdiction.

Perfect order reigns in the Clatsop county clerk's office, now under his management. New methods of indexing records and document files have been introduced; lawyers, their clients, and the public generally can, on a moment's notice, be furnished with any paper on record they may desire to see. The records are kept right up to date and the accounts of the county are so clearly and perfectly posted that at any and all times it can be seen just how much money is on hand, what bills are owing, and the condition of the bonded indebtedness and warrant and interest accounts. No confusion prevails anywhere in the department, and it is actually a pleasure to do business with the office, instead of being a bore and an annoyance, as it is in so many county offices.

Whatever may be the condition of the secretary of state's office, or the efficiency of past secretaries, it is safe to say that under the administration of Mr. Dunbar, if he is elected to serve the people, neither the office nor the officer will suffer in comparison with past administrations. The Astorian will go one step further, and predict that at the close of his term of office Mr. Dunbar's reign will be found to excel in business methods, correctness and fairness any preceding administration of that office in the history of the state.

COAST WELL WATCHED.

A Washington dispatch says, after sev-

eral weeks of work along the entire stretch of the Atlantic and gulf coasts, the navy department has completed the most comprehensive and efficient system for observing the approach of a hostile fleet that has ever been put into operation. A new bureau has been created for this purpose, known as the coast signal service, in charge of Capt. Bartlett, who attends to this, as well as the work of the naval board of information. The system has the services of 2,300 men, stretched along the coast from Bar Harbor, Me., to Galveston, Tex. These are divided into thirty-four central stations, about 60 to 100 miles apart, along the coast. The stations are, in turn, connected directly by telegraph with the coast signal office of the navy department, and operators on duty night and day keeping the navy department in constant telegraphic touch with the entire stretch of Atlantic and gulf coasts.

Secretary Long projected this plan a month ago, and \$75,000 was set aside to establish the points of observation along the coast. After selecting the thirty-four central points from Maine to Texas, rush orders were given to build observation towers. The naval militia men, with the rank of naval quartermasters, are now on duty at each of these stations. The towers are completed, and also the small houses for their living purposes. There are 23 of these militiamen now in the service.

The next step was to have the light-house service made an adjunct to this coast observation. This was done through the cooperation of the treasury department, and the light-house force of 120 men, scattered from Maine to Texas, are assisting the work of observation. The life-saving service was brought into similar cooperation, so that now 1200 life-savers are added to the observation force. By arrangement with the telegraph companies the reports from these observers take precedence over the private telegraphic business.

The work of observation has been thoroughly systematized. Watchers are kept on the towers throughout the day and night. The life-saving crews in particular are assigned to night duty, and they patrol the beach throughout the night on the lookout for approaching ships. All the central points and the observers have been supplied with telescopes and full appliances for marine observation. They are also supplied with torches, rockets, and other paraphernalia for signaling.

The results already secured have shown the efficiency of the plan adopted. Naval vessels passing along the coast are able to signal night or day by torches and otherwise, with the naval observers along the beach, and these signals are immediately telegraphed to the navy department here.

Each morning reports are received from every point from Bar Harbor to Galveston stating briefly that everything is quiet or otherwise, as the case may be. Thus far the day reports have been uniformly accurate, and the night reports have been at times alarming. The observers, being on the alert and new at their work, report every suspicious light seen off shore, and frequently attach serious significance to it.
