times, but he disavowed some of the statements attributed to him in which he predicted its capture in forty-eight hours or in any number of hours. He is aware of the difficulties confronting Shafter, but he is also convinced that the care, energy and stability with which the army of the United States has taken hold of the business in hand will carry it to victory in such a way as to surprise the procrastinating Spaniards.

The president and his cabinet take much comfort from the consideration of General Shafter's reports to the secretary of war. Every line has been anxiously scanned for information about the health and spirits of the troops in a climate about which the most distressing reports are recalled. The weather in Washington has been extremely hot during the past few days and it has been assumed that the troops are suffering from weather worse than here, with the added discomfort of marching in a tropical sun, assaults from strange insect pests and in some cases the burden of unsuitable clothing. If any of these inconveniences are felt, they have been borne stoically, for no one would have come to headquarters to show that the men are not having a better time than they were in camp at Chickamauga, Tampa or Camp Alger.

Pando is hurrying to Santiago but he is heavily handicapped, being obliged to guard supplies which he is carrying to that town. General Shafter is fully aware of the rate at which he is advancing and of the difficulties attending his march to Santiago. This information he gets from hour to hour from the insurgents who are co-operating with him and who are familiar with the country between Santiago and Manzanillo. It would not surprise the president to learn at any time that Morro castle had fallen into the hands of General Shafter's advance guard.

FATAL SHOOTING NEAR EUGENE.

[Associated Press Dispatch.] Eugene, June 30.—Charles Turner, aged 18, was shot and killed today by T. M. McGrath, aged 65, about six miles east of Harrisburg. Turner had been working on the farm of Harvey Somerville, near the McGrath place. He visited with McGrath's boy, about his own age, and McGrath thought he was visiting his wife, with whom he has had trouble. Turner went to the Somerville farm, and, going up to Turner, who was working in the hay field, spoke a few words, then stepped back and shot him with a revolver. The ball entered the left breast and Turner dropped dead. The shooting was witnessed by Somerville and two others.

McGrath gave himself up and was placed under arrest by Constable McLean, of Harrisburg.

Turner was the son of J. P. Turner, of this city, and was considered a bright young man of good habits. His body was brought to Eugene tonight. Much indignation is expressed here over the shooting.

REPORTED BATTLE AT SANTIAGO.

[Associated Press Dispatch.] Madrid, June 30.—Midnight.—It is rumored here that a great battle has been fought at Santiago, resulting favorably to the Spaniards. The report is unconfirmed.

IN THE ORIENT.

The Japanese Central Tea Guild Protest Against the American War Tax.

[Associated Press Dispatch.] Vancouver, B. C., June 30.—Late mail advices from Japan say that the president of the Central Tea Guild has telegraphed President McKinley that the tax on tea will check commerce between Japan and America, and ought therefore to be reconsidered. Five thousand tea firers will be put out of employment in consequence of the duty.

The district surrounding Yokohama was visited by a fearful storm June 5. The rivers Yoshida, Oka and the canal overflowed, submerging a part of Otomachi, the whole of Aiohiko, Sumiyohiko and Onoyecho. At Jin Yumoto several houses

collapsed and four men were killed. A bridge over the Itohi river was washed away, besides a part of the embankment at Hadano, where two persons lost their lives.

In Tokio 24 houses were flooded. Similar reports have been received from Aiohiko, Itohiko, Miya, Baitama and Nagano prefectures. On Yagayama island, one of the Itohiko group, some 30 houses were damaged, while the wheat and millet plantations suffered to such an extent that production will probably be reduced to 70 per cent.

Persecution disturbances are reported in China. People at Wols and in Peking provinces are in a state of unrest, and warships have been sent to the former port and to Foochow. Riots have broken out in Canton, and there has been serious rioting in Ningbo. The Black Flags are in revolt.

It is reported in Shanghai that the American mission establishment at Tongchow, near Wuchow, has been attacked by a mob, looted and burned. There is no news of any members of the mission being killed, as it is probable that they managed to escape in boats. Mr. Oliver is in charge of the mission at Tongchow. The victory has been reported by the American consul to instruct the prefect of Wuchow to dispatch troops to quell the disturbances and afford proper protection to the missionaries.

Matsui, the rebellious Japanese chief, has revolted again. He has formed an alliance with an inland tribe which has been fighting him. H. M. S. Plover has sailed for Japan.

Dispatches received by Shanghai newspapers from Tien Tsin say the Russian consul at that port has received instructions from the Russian authorities at Port Arthur and Tientsin to the effect that in future any foreigners desiring to visit the last-named place must first obtain special passports from the Russian consul.

A secret document which points clearly to the ultimate plans of Russia in regard to Manchuria is the heading of Russian official documents, which makes the governor general of Siberia governor also of Port Arthur, Tientsin and their dependencies.

A Peking telegram dated June 2 says: "The request of the French government to construct a railway between Peking and Tsingtau having been refused by China, the former has sent notification that she will proceed with building the road when she pleases."

The Japanese elections will be held the latter part of July.

Japan's civil code has been adopted and comes into force the 1st of July. Owing to the sudden dissolution of the diet the new commercial code was not sanctioned.

The Japanese minister of agriculture and commerce is credited with the intention of establishing a Japanese-American bank with a capital of \$5,000,000 under government sanction.

In a United States consular court at Nagasaki June 15, Kelly, the proprietor of a grungroup in China, was found guilty of the murder of an American sailor named Gannon, and was sentenced to death.

The Dutch steamer Smit was lost on the voyage to Yokohama with a cargo of beans. The crew was saved.

The German steamer Stork foundered June 5 while bound from Newchang to Yokohama. Her crew was rescued.

A Japanese paper says the date of the operation of the new customs tariff is dependent upon the final approval of the new treaty by the Austrian reichsrath, but it cannot now be long delayed.

According to the Singapore News, the Achsen war, which has been in progress for twenty-six years, is drawing to an end through the vigorous measures now being employed by the Dutch, who have hitherto tried subsidies and conciliatory measures. Colonel Van Houtz, after clearing Achsen proper of the enemy, is preparing to attack it with a force of 7,000 men in the province of Padu, where the ruler sultan of Achsen holds court.

THERE IS A DIFFERENCE.

[Associated Press Dispatch.] Washington, June 30.—The Hawaiian resolutions were taken up in the senate today and Tillman, of South Carolina, spoke against them.

On the race problem he said: "For my part I declare that the races are not equal and never were. God never made them so, and while I subscribe to the doctrine that among the inalienable rights of man is the right of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, I declare my unalterable faith in the declaration that the white race is superior to the colored."
