OREGON AT THE EXPOSITION.

Mr. Johnson Speaks Highly of the Different Exhibits at the State.

Mr. A. J. Johnson, superintendent of the Oregon forestry exhibit, arrived home from the Omaha exposition Sunday. In speaking of his trip, Mr. Johnson said: "I was glad to be back in the summer weather of Oregon. The weather here is better and it is almost continuously fairing."

"The exposition itself is a true copy of the world's fair. The buildings, grounds, lagoons and the electrical display in the same as it was at Chicago, except of similar dimensions."

"The government building is located at the west end of the lagoon, occupying the same position as the administration building of the world's fair."

"The agriculture, manufactures, machinery and electrical buildings are located on the north side of the lagoon. The fine arts, liberal arts and mining displays are on the south side. The horticulture building, the grand music place are on the east end with the state buildings."

"The midway begins north and runs one-half mile south and every lake known to mankind is represented there, and they fully equal in number to that at the world's fair."

"This is the largest exhibition since the world's fair, being much larger than the midwinter fair at the Atlanta or Nashville exhibitions."

"The exposition means much for Oregon, the state's showing being way ahead of anything at the fair, especially the forestry exhibit. The eastern people are wonderful to see trees so far west in diameter and so far in height. A sawed piece of Oregon fir, 92 feet long and 31 inches square attracts the most attention. It is perfectly clear and many visitors believe it to be split, owing to its great length. Storage to see trees are people can hardly believe that these specimens came from Oregon. They invariably remark that these trees grow in California."

"The Clinton Mill Co. has an exhibit of spruce and the Bryant Vail mill has an exhibit of larch. The Perry Lumber Co. of La Grande has an exhibit of larch and yellow pine, and the Western Lumber Co., of Portland, has a fine exhibit there of a big log cut in the woods back of Westport which attracts a great deal of attention. The state's exhibit consists of sections of all the trees indigenous to the state. The state commissioners have rented from the 30 varieties of woods finished and unfinished and they are all magnificent specimens, and the finest that have ever been exhibited. I have there also a historical collection of all the commercial growths of the Pacific coast and a collection of medicinal herbs and roots. This latter is the most complete and instructive of any forestry exhibit that has ever been displayed. The other Oregon exhibits show very far ahead of anything at the fair. There is a very fine mineral exhibit, horticultural exhibit and the fish exhibit has not yet arrived, but I hope the Columbia river exhibitors will make an elaborate showing. The Columbia river salmon has the name of being the finest in the world and there is now an opportunity to show the excellent quality of the fish. A few days before I left Omaha we received some fresh salmon packed in ice, which arrived in splendid condition and all who saw them were loud in their expressions of admiration and wished to test their quality on the dinner table. We presented them later on they would have an opportunity of getting down to a salmon banquet, with the compliments of the Columbia river exhibitors, was so prepared to have all the state representatives and officials of the Trans-Mississippi exposition. I hope the countrymen who are now in fulfilling our promises and respect with a liberal supply."

"Oregon is thoroughly in it at the exposition. There is no exhibit from either Washington or California and the state commands attention as the representative of the Pacific northwest. It is Oregon grain, Oregon timber, Oregon fruit, whatever you like."

"I am now going with the Maximas to Mount St. Helens and from there I will take my other mountain trips as usual, after our returning to Omaha."

SENATOR CHARGED WITH ROBBERY.
Senator Kenney, of Delaware, charged with aiding in robbing a bank.

Wilmington, July 11.—A trial unprecedented in the annals of this country, that of a member of the United States senate on a criminal charge, was begun in this city today before Judge Edward C. Brad-

ford. The defendant is Richard Rollin Kenney, of Dover, junior United States senator from Delaware, indicted on a charge of aiding and abetting William N. Hoagse, who has confessed to the robbery of the First National bank of Dover, of which institution he was the paying teller, of \$30,000. The eleven counts in the indictment to which Kenney is charged are pleaded not guilty, charge him with aiding and abetting Hoagse to the extent of \$15,000. Two men, Ezekiel L. Cooper, of Milford, and Thomas L. Clark, of Dover, have already been convicted under similar charges and are now serving terms of eighteen months and five years respectively in the New Jersey penitentiary.

THANKSGIVING SERMONS.
Noted Divine Attributes Our Success in War to the Heavenly Father.
New York, July 11.—Rev. Thomas Dixon Jr., preached a thanksgiving sermon in the Grand Opera House according to the theme "God blesses the victors at sea." He expressed boundless gratitude for the result. He said that a review of the history of the country during the 12 years of existence could not fail to impress one that its presidents had been led by God.

"Speaking of the fight at Santiago, he said: "Reverse the conditions at Santiago, place our army in the trenches and the army was never known that could drive it out and annihilate those trenches. Our losses were marvelous, providentially small, compared with the results obtained."

"It was the fear of the army that drove Cervera from Santiago. And there again was God's protecting hand sheltering men while hundreds of the enemy were slain."

"God has given us dominion over the seas and there is hope for future years of glorious new national life."

Rev. Dr. Ganahan of Chicago occupied the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church and his sermon was appropriate to the day. He took for his text Isaiah VIII, 1.—"Our president has called us together to the altar of thanksgiving today and we obey. We are thankful for a flag so woven of divine ideas and humane sentiment that where ever it floats it means the law and hope to the oppressed. We are thankful for the patriot who held as long as possible to the conviction that these ideas and sentiments ought to be awarded a bloodless victory. Thankful that our army and navy have proved themselves as worthy to succeed their most brave, generous and Christian ancestry, thankful that that our foes have been defeated and slain, but that this is a better world in fire and red rite than it was at the dawn of last Sunday."

"American ideas have come to such maturity that it is clear that Americans will Americanize Europe or European ideas Europeanize America. Our ideas of government and humane progress have already gone farther than our battleships have carried them. We have assumed public responsibility for them at Manila and Santiago. We can rest our foreign policy only on such ideas and sentiments as make us victorious over greed and anarchy at home. Let those go forth and continue to conquer."

ORE FROM ALASKA.
Plenty of Gold Believed to Be on Kodiak Island.

San Francisco, July 11.—The schooner Albatross has arrived direct from Kodiak Island with sixty bags of low grade ore from the famous mountain of gold which Captain Moore of the schooner Free Trade so glowingly described to R. Taylor Watson, of England.

The story of how Watson and his friends were lost has been told, but Captain Gilbert of the Albatross says that there is considerable gold on the island, and that if properly worked the claims taken up there will pay. He has located a ledge for R. P. Hotelling and others of San Francisco.

POLITICS KILLED HIM.
Kansas City, July 11.—City Auditor T. C. Bell is dead of typhoid fever, after an illness of two months. Before entering politics in the last city campaign Mr. Bell was a member of the Journal editorial staff.

OTIS WAITING FOR ORDERS.
Has Not Yet Received Instructions for Departure of Next Expedition.

San Francisco, July 11.—Major General Otis has not yet received definite orders regarding the sailing of the next Manila expedition, but the impression prevails in foreign circles that the transporta Peru and City of Puebla will get away on Wednesday. General Otis expects to sail on one of the vessels, or on a mail steamer, for he has been ordered to be in Honolulu when the formal annexation of Hawaii takes place. There have been no new developments as to the transports engaged or the troops to be assigned to the fifth expedition to the Philippine islands. The gunboat Bennington is at anchor in the bay with steam up. She is ready to depart at a moment's notice.

Her destination is not positively known, though she will probably go to Honolulu. The cruise Philadelphia is rapidly being prepared for sea at the Mare Island navy yard.

Work on the animal transport ship Tacoma will begin today. She will carry 30 horses, besides a large quantity of stores and supplies for Manila. At Honolulu the horses will be landed and given a few days' exercise before proceeding to the Philippines.

Lieutenant Colonel Hornet, of the Tenth Pennsylvania, has returned to Camp Merritt with 26 recruits.

Lieutenant Colonel Little, of the Tenth Kansas, says that he has not tendered his resignation and has no intention of doing so.

Corporal Wilson H. McAllister, of company M, Twentieth Kansas infantry, died in the field hospital of pneumonia.

Private G. D. Granville, company A, First Tennessee regiment, died at the Marine hospital Sunday of meningitis.

KLONDIKERS EN ROUTE.
San Francisco, July 11.—The schooner Thomas E. Hazard, Captain Anderson, has arrived from Philadelphia with a party of Klondike treasure seekers on board. She had a very stormy passage of 16 days, her only stop being at Valparaiso. Her passengers and crew are determined to push on to the gold fields.

FRUIT CROP A FAILURE.
Oakland, July 11.—The dry season has so seriously injured the fruit crops of the Livermore valley that it is estimated that the yield will be about one-third that of last year. In some localities the crop will practically be a dead loss.

If the heat is excessive between now and harvest time the output of even the most advantageous vineyards will barely be normal.

NATIVE SONS OF OREGON.
A New Society Organized in Portland and Elects Officers.

Portland, July 11.—The grand cabin of the Native Sons of Oregon is now a legal entity and the foundation is now laid for a permanent organization that is certain to become prominent in the future history of Oregon. This grand cabin is the grand headquarters of the native sons of Oregon, and the grand officers and grand trustees already chosen will carry on the work until the next annual meeting of the grand cabin, which will be held in Portland June 9, 1899, at which time successors to the present officers will be elected. The society will be a secret organization and subordinate cabins will be organized throughout the state by a charter granted by the grand cabin. There is a plan also to be adopted so as to have an auxiliary department for the native daughters.

The following native sons were elected by the grand cabin as grand officers for the ensuing term:

Grand president, John C. Leonard, grand first vice president, Joseph D. Lee, grand second vice president, Frank M. Robinson, grand secretary, Eugene D. White, grand treasurer, H. C. Worman, grand auditor, H. B. Beckman, grand inside secretary, Charles T. Belcher.

Grand outside secretary, Claude Strahan, grand marshal, John W. Mintz.

THE HAWAIIAN PROGRAM.
San Francisco, July 11.—Major General Otis is authorized by the statement that the regiment to be stationed at Honolulu has not yet been selected. Rear Admiral Miller, as the naval representative of the United States, will take formal part in the raising of the flag at Honolulu. The United States ship Albatross and the gunboat Bennington will, with the cruiser Philadelphia, participate in the demonstration.

The admiral expects to sail on July 29 on the Philadelphia. The cruiser will carry no troops. After the ceremony of annexation the admiral expects to return here to resume charge of the naval establishment on this coast.

CANADIAN ELECTIONS.
Victoria, B. C., July 11.—The latest returns from Saturday's election indicate that the government is defeated by two votes.

HEAVY EXPORT YEAR.
Washington, July 11.—The record of 1898 most remarkable year in our export trade was completed today by the Bureau of statistics so far as it relates to the exportation of wheat, corn and other breadstuffs, pork, beef and other provisions, cotton and mineral outputs. These articles form a large per centage of the total exports, and from manufacturers. The sum of wheat and flour exported during the year just ended amounted to \$121,861,293, the sum only surpassed in 1889 and 1892.

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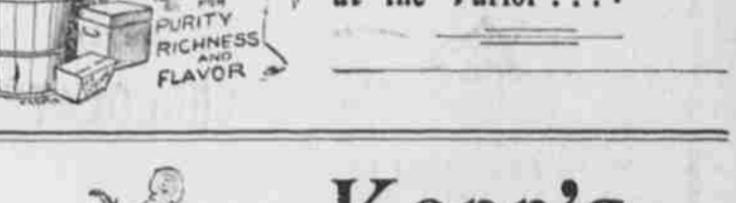
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
