Dr. J. S. Bishop left for Portland yesterday morning to attend the meeting of the National Council of the Congressional churches now being held there. He will return Thursday noon.

S. W. Larson, fishing boat No. 52 at the Columbia River Packing Co.'s cannery, delivered a salmon with its adipose fin missing at the cannery yesterday. The fish was a male and weighed 37 pounds.

The Astoria baseball team met the Warrenton line at Warrenton Sunday. The former won, the score standing 5 to 6. Next Sunday the Astorians will meet the Port Canby team at Alderbrook.

The British ship John Cook, Captain McKee, on her arrival off the river Sunday with Pilot Skipple on board, sailed into the harbor. The John Cook is 41 days from Nagasaki in ballast and had a good passage all the way.

Mayor Bergman yesterday vetoed the ordinance appropriating \$100 to restrain the voters to the farmers' convention on the ground that the ordinance was illegal. The ordinance to construct a sewer on Eleventh street was signed.

In accordance with the proclamation issued by President McKinley, thanksgiving services were held in all of the churches Sunday. In several of the churches members of the congregation were called upon and gave brief addresses on patriotism.

The pleasant Mr. Captain Babcock, resumed carrying mail yesterday to Knappa, Clifton, Westport, Bugby and Cathlamet, having closed a contract with the government for another month. Mail leaves Astoria daily, except Sunday, at 12:30 a. m., arriving at 10 a. m.

The I. R. & N. Co. has closed a contract with the government for the delivery of all freight from Astoria to Fort Canby and Stevens. The Stevens freight will be delivered to the Canby, leaving Astoria at 2 p. m. daily, and the Ilwaco and Canby will divide freight for Port Canby.

At a meeting of the regatta committee yesterday it was finally decided to hold the regatta August 19 and 22, allowing the intervening Sunday for an excursion to Seaside, to be given under the auspices of the committee. Many new features are planned this year, and from the spirit and enthusiasm now beginning to be manifested, there is little doubt that the event of 1938 will eclipse all previous efforts, uniformly successful as they have been.

The trophy for the championship team of the A. F. C. bowlers begins tonight and will be continued three nights each week, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, until the latter part of the month. Six bowlers of A class, making the highest averages constitutes a team who will try conclusions with the Multnomah club. Thus far the Multnomah club has succeeded in defeating all comers. The trophy is of solid silver, shape and size of a king pin, suitably engraved.

The delinquent tax roll with an alias warrant attached has been turned over by ex-Sheriff Hare to the county court and amounts to \$3,201.54. The collections amounted to \$6,400.00 and the 1 per cent penalty \$31.74 which was paid over to the treasurer as per his receipt. The taxes are being collected as follows: Ad valorem, \$750; levies, \$2,421.54 which amount has been paid to the deputy sheriff, and the printing said amount to be deducted from their bills. The report was received by the county court and ordered placed on file.

About forty members of the crews of the wrecked Yukon river boats Gamecock and Stagbound have commenced suit against the company for wages. The men signed for a year with a month's advance, and these terms the company refused to agree to after the wreck occurred. A settlement was made with a portion of the crew by paying them what was due from the date of sailing up to the time the wreck occurred. The remainder of the crews refused to accept these terms and have filed a claim for wages from the date of signing articles up to the date of the filing of the suit. The crews have been here some two weeks since the boats were wrecked and they claim two months have elapsed since they signed articles, for which they will sue the company. The case will be tried in Portland.

The Niemala road matter, over which there has been considerable argument in the county court during the last few days, has been dismissed. The half dozen or so families living back in the timber near Olney seem to have some difficulty in getting a road, the matter having been dismissed two or three times because of irregularity in the proceedings. This time it appears that Commissioner Peterson had expressed himself in favor of the road, some land near the road had been here some two weeks since the boats were wrecked and they claim two months have elapsed since they signed articles, for which they will sue the company. The case will be tried in Portland.

The many friends of Captain H. F. Packard, formerly of Astoria, will be pleased to hear of his prosperity and pleasant surroundings at his home near Vancouver, Washington. Captain Packard left Astoria for the neighborhood of Vancouver nearly three years ago, and by his skill and industry in his new location has made one of the best fruit farms in all that famous fruit country. Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Smith, who have just returned from a brief visit with Captain Packard's family, are enthusiastic over the captain's hospitality and the pleasures of a visit where all kinds of fruit are to be had in abundance. It is enough to make an Astoria man's mouth water to be told that while there are no indifferent cherries brought from California and elsewhere and retailed here for about 8 cents per pound, Captain Packard could not find purchasers for his magnificent Royal Anna and Black Republican, with which his trees were fairly loaded this season. 12 crates per ton were delivered at the boat in Vancouver. It seems that small fruits of all kinds flourish on Captain Packard's farm and Mr. Smith says that he received almost a fabulous price for the first peaches gathered from his trees this season, which were of an unusually fine variety. Most of Captain Packard's place is set out in prunes, and Mr. Smith says he now has 2,000 trees in full bearing which are so heavily laden with fruit that they have to be propped up, although the fruit is not yet matured. Besides his fruit, Mr. Smith says Captain Packard has a number of English walnut trees now bearing, besides some soft shell almonds and other nuts. Taken altogether Captain Packard is not only delightfully situated but in a fair way to receive most substantial returns from his investment of a few years ago in that section of Washington.
