The expenditure of \$2,000,000 a year in propagation by the state would make Oregon's output of canned salmon a million cases. The product from the Columbia can be marketed cheaper than that of the Fraser river, on account of transportation facilities, and if the output can be increased by increasing the size of the gold dollars for the state, New York appropriates almost \$100,000 per year simply to maintain its game fish. California appropriates half that amount, and yet her commercial fish output is far less than that of Astoria alone. This means business for Oregon fishermen.
