The ladies of the Astoria Emergency corps have sent many useful articles to the soldier boys who have departed from Portland to go to the front. The articles were distributed through the emergency corps of Portland and consisted of pocket-dot-kits, caps, and bands "loop" towels, etc. These presents come very nearly everything necessary to bachelor life and will help to smooth the life of the boys in blue when they are roughing it at the front in Cuba or the Philippines. The Astoria Emergency corps is rewarded as the banner corps as to the desirability of their outfits, and the presents they have sent are highly prized for being well made and for the neatness of the articles.

### ACCIDENTS TO FISHERMEN.

Several Lives and Nets Lost—Too Many Chances Taken.

A number of accidents to fishermen were reported yesterday. During the heavy fog Wednesday night, while the steamer Columbia lay to off the river, it is reported that a fisherman named Hensberg, who was using John Berglund's gear, attempted to sail home. As he passed another fish boat at anchor they collided and a warning to him that he was going in the wrong direction and would fetch up in the breakers. The anchor floated back over the waves. "I am going home," this was the last word of them, and a boat, supposed to be the same one, was afterwards seen near the jetty broken in pieces, and with a man's legs protruding through the upturned bottom.

It was also reported that two other boats were captured the same night. The first boat is said to have been one of the 1911 regatta prize winners. A fisherman named Adolph, of the north shore, lost an entire new net Thursday night. The men have been taking too many chances in their anxiety to make up for the short catches of fish during the slack run.

A fishing boat was discovered just outside the breakers of Grimes' hotel, Seaside, Thursday night. There was a man in the boat, but there was no way to help him. Yesterday morning one of the oars was picked up on the beach, but the boat had disappeared. As there was a strong ebb tide at the time, it is feared the man perished. The oar is painted white, but there are no other means of identification. The life saving crews have been out day and night but no reports have as yet been received from them.

Thomas Silva, a Portuguese fisherman, dropped dead in his boat at Chinook sands about 11 o'clock Friday night from heart disease. He was picking up his net and had about 50 fathoms in the boat when, without any warning, he dropped dead in the stern sheet. Silva was fishing in boat No. 19 for the Cutting Packing company, and was one of the oldest and most favorably known fishermen on the river. He leaves two sisters living at Gardner, Douglas county. The body was brought to this city yesterday and Coroner Pohl telegraphed his relatives. He was a member of the Workmen and Masons.

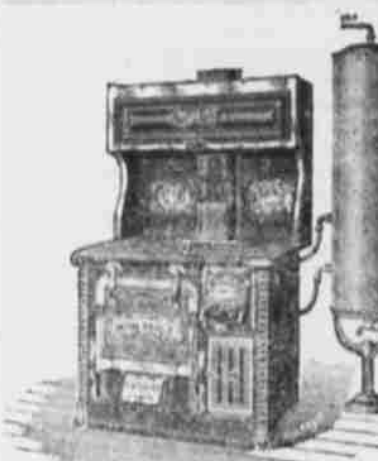
