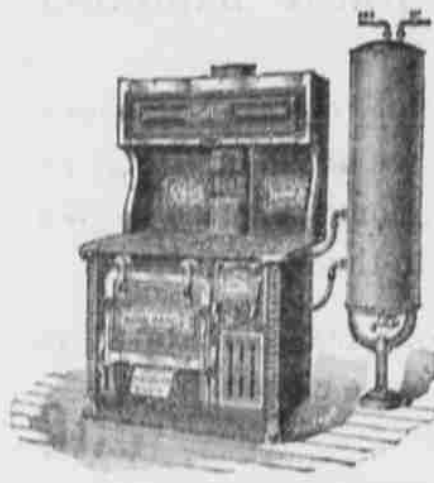

ACTING SECRETARY ALLEN, OF THE NAVY DEPARTMENT, HAS RECEIVED A DISPATCH NOTIFYING HIM THAT A NAVAL FORCE SENT BY ADMIRAL SAMPSON HAS APPEARED IN THE HARBOR OF MANZANILLO AND DEMANDED ITS SURRENDER.

The commandant of the city declined to comply with the demand and an engagement took place, which is said to have resulted victoriously for the Americans.
