OUR GRAIN SHIPMENTS. A glance at the figures for the shipping season 1921-22 furnishes interesting information and food for reflection. The totals of wheat and flour shipments, reduced to bushels, show the following:

The shipments from California during the same period were 12,952 bushels of wheat, including flour. Of this, 13,300 barrels of flour to the Hawaiian Islands and 70,300 barrels to Central America were shipped from the Columbia river to San Francisco and reshipped there and rightfully belong in our export figures.

The shipments of 18,802 bushels wheat and flour from the Columbia river for '21-'22 were the largest in ten years past. The nearest approach to these figures being the season of 1914-'15, when the shipments reached 12,475,000 bushels.

The total of shipments of wheat from Oregon to California for '21-'22 was \$12,781 cents and 12,781 barrels of flour. The highest charter rate paid during that season was \$4. the lowest 22¢ 61.
