The Oregonian said on Sunday that the common point lumber rate is not wanted by Astoria, except as a preliminary to forcing wheat down the river by rail.

Statement showing what the farmer receives for wheat at Walls Walla when it has to be shipped to Portland to load into ships, and what he would receive if the grain producers could ship direct to Astoria at common point rates:

If Astoria had terminal rates: Farmer would receive for 100 bushels of wheat \$54.52

Farmer would receive, via Astoria, 54.52 cents a bushel, a difference in favor of the producer, if shipped via Astoria, of 6.61 cents per bushel.

On 20,000,000 bushels, the amount which it is estimated the O. R. & N. Company will haul into Portland this season, the saving to producers would be, if brought to Astoria at common point rates, \$1,254,000.

When it is considered that the Northern Pacific is now taking to the Sound fully 40 per cent of the total export product for wheat at the mouth of the Columbia river, it is not an unreasonable assumption that nearly all the inland Empire wheat would come to Astoria.
