C. H. Cooper made the excellent score of 61 at the alleys yesterday. Mrs. Stine and Mrs. Dellinger were high for the ladies, with 58. The first games in the Wise contest were bowled last night, but the playing was very poor.

During 1898 the county treasurer has paid the city of Astoria from the special road fund \$2,967.70 and road district No. 1 (Warrenton) \$22. All the rest of the road districts of the county have received \$2,475.84, or about \$14.50 - mile.

A dozen men from Fort Canby pulled over in a life boat Sunday night to meet Corporal King Lee, who had returned from a trip to Portland. The soldiers are all joy fellows and get along much better here than at the fort. The captain of the company is said to be unpopular among the men. The troop now stationed at Canby is company C, heavy artillery.

The membership list is now open at the home of Mrs. A. A. Cleveland. The demands on the society have become so urgent that it has been decided to adopt this means to increase its income.

An elegant supper was served and pictures of, after which short speeches were delivered by Messrs. Desley and Wright of the U. S. A. Lieutenant Sherman of the naval reserve, and others. Dancing and singing was then commenced, when roundt out the evening.

Peter Carlson, better known as the "Terrible Swede," was up before Police Judge Nelson yesterday for being drunk. Officer Bettem made the arrest, with the assistance of two other policemen. When Bettem first took charge of Carlson, the prisoner became fractious, and the officer was unable to manage him alone. He called for assistance, and two other officers came to his relief. Carlson refused to go in the ordinary way, and it was necessary to drag him to the station. The arrest was made early Sunday morning. Judge Nelson fined Carlson \$25.

Judge McBride convened the district court in adjourned session yesterday. The most important matter to come before the court was the case of Mitchell Zankovich, charged with the murder of "Pat" Barnes. The work of empanelling a jury took up considerable time, but the following were finally selected: Carl Johnson, William J. Heckard, T. S. Henderson, J. L. Haysett, William Larson, C. A. Mathers, C. Abner, A. Erik, H. F. Astrip, L. B. Belland, Charles Guiver, and H. Ford. After the selection of the jury court adjourned over until 9 this morning, when the trial will proceed. The case has excited great interest and there was a large crowd in the courtroom when the case was first set for trial. For the past day or two the prisoner has been rather nervous, but he has given Jailer Binder no trouble.

The following ordinances for the collection of assessments remaining unpaid on the following streets were signed by the mayor yesterday: The East Astoria alleyway; Eighteenth street, from Exchange to Grand avenue; Irving avenue, from Commercial to Exchange; Twelfth street, from Franklin to Exchange; Thirtieth street No. 1. Other ordinances signed were: To pay L. Lebeck for the improvement of Commercial street; to issue and sell bonds for the improvement of Twenty-ninth street, from Franklin to Grand; for the improvement of Grand avenue, from Twenty-ninth to Thirty-third; for the improvement of "Thirty-first, from Franklin to Grand; to pay L. Lebeck \$56.77 for the improvement of Twenty-ninth street, from Franklin to Grand; for the improvement of Grand avenue, from Twenty-ninth to Thirty-third, and \$21.71 for the improvement of Grand and Franklin avenues respectively.

The Oriental liner Mogul is on the way down the river and is due here any time this month, having left Portland Sunday morning. Her draft is 21 feet 6 inches and she is probably getting stuck off and on, as otherwise she would arrive here Sunday evening. Another reason for the delay is that a large steamer like the Mogul, heavily laden, can only round the sharp curves in day time until she gets well down the river, and, therefore, has to lay over and start anchor during the night. When the steamship Athenian, which left this port a few days ago, was "blacked out" from Portland she made the run in two days and a half, being compelled to anchor over night on the way, and then had much trouble in navigating down the river. The Mogul, although of lesser length and lighter draft than the Athenian, can round the bluff, and keep in the channel only during daylight, which is partly the cause of her nonarrival here. The Mogul is four laden, but will finish her cargo by taking on 1000 sacks at this port.

The result of the bowling in the first month's contest for the Herman Wise medals is made known in the latest bulletin issued at the Astoria Football Club. Frank Goodell, a class B man, with two pins handicap, finished high, with an average of 41 fat. He bowled only 13 games. For the scratch men Wise, Cooper and Burroughs finished close. Mr. Wise kept a record of his scores for the purpose only of determining just how he is bowling. He offered the trophy and of the games is not in the contest. He played 46 games, with an average of 39 1/2. This is the best average made in the tournament. Cooper was a close second, with 32.9 for 52 games, Burroughs getting 28.5 for 52 games. Allen, of class B, finished in 23 games with 32.42 average. Mrs. Dellinger was high for the ladies, with an average of 36.40 for 15 games. She is a class B bowler, with one pin handicap. Mrs. Stine's average was 34.9 for 29 games; Mrs. Normlie's, 32.3 for 12 games; and Mrs. Wiese's 21.9 for 24 games. The three latter players are in class B. Hereafter the first 25 games bowled by the men and the first 15 games bowled by the women will count in this contest. Six games must be bowled on each alley by the men (the old game) and three by the women (the contestant chooses), while three games must be bowled on each alley by the women, the remaining three to be bowled on any of the alleys chosen by the player. In this way a man's work on all alleys will be shown, and the contest will be made the more satisfactory.

TAX-PAYERS' PROTEST AGAINST FIVE-MILL LEVY.

Petition the County Court Not to Make the Proposed Assessment for Road Building Purposes.

The petition to be presented this morning to the county court against the proposed levy of the 5-mill road tax has been signed by a number of additional taxpayers since it was circulated Saturday.

The petition, with the names of all the remonstrants, is as follows: "We, the undersigned citizens of Clatsop county respectfully request that the taxes of this county be heavy. Expenses are heavy, which cannot be avoided and will require large sums of taxes to meet, and will necessitate large levies.

"That the tax-payers for several years have borrowed money and mortgaged their property in order to meet the taxes; that many of these mortgages and debts are still unpaid. Many were not able to borrow money, and large quantities of the property of the county has been confiscated and bought in by the county and now held by it.

"That there is no demand for real estate, and, in the opinion of the undersigned, it is not wise at the present time to increase the levy or to make it more than can be possibly avoided.

"That, owing to the above, and to the fact that many of the roads in Clatsop county are not laid out in the proper places or in the proper manner, and also the taxes in the road laws, the undersigned think it not in the interest of economy, or otherwise judicious, to increase the levy for roads, and, therefore, protest against any increase of levy for that purpose.

"They also ask that the levy be made as small as practicable and the expenses cut down during the next year so as to come within the estimate and levy."
