Senator Hanna is of the opinion that no American battle ship will ever again be compelled to make such a run as did the Oregon, from San Francisco on the Pacific coast to Key West on the Atlantic. He says that in all likelihood the appropriation for the proposed Nicaragua canal from the Atlantic to the Pacific will be passed this winter by congress. The senator has said that the sentiment in favor of the canal is almost universal, and that no difficulty will be experienced in the passage of the bill. The estimated cost of the canal is between \$150,000,000 and \$200,000,000, and it is said it will take five years to construct. Congress is now waiting for the report of the war department committee on the subject.

Now is the harvest time for American manufacturers in Germany. Consul Monaghan, writing to the state department from Chemnitz, says that if our shoe men, hardware makers, agricultural implement dealers and electrical supply manufacturers would establish agencies in the fatherland, and push their goods as strongly as German dealers do in this country, our sales in that country would double in a few years. Our shoes are far better than the ones made there, he says; our furniture is handsomer, more durable and cheaper, and our machinery excels anything made in the old world. Mr. Monaghan warns our inventors to take out German patents for their machines if they wish to reap any benefits from the sale of the same in the empire. German machinists, he says, are now busily engaged in imitating every useful article of American make that is not protected by German patents, and counterfeiters are gaining a larger sale than the genuine.

In view of the uncertainty that seems to enshroud the doings of the peace commission, and the policy laid down by the president for their government, it is a satisfaction to know that the time is rapidly approaching when the whole question will be expedited if not settled by action in another quarter. There is a strong probability that the Philippine and Cuban questions will come up in congress very early in the session. There is every prospect that the war will not be technically ended by the first of January, and that the government will still have 100,000 men under arms, many of them doing garrison duty on some islands. As there will be no money to pay these troops after that date, the appropriation for the army running for six months only, it will be necessary to bring in an appropriation bill for the army very soon after congress convenes. That will certainly afford an opportunity for some discussion as to the government's policy toward territorial expansion, and the vote on the bill should to some extent be an indication of the attitude of the two houses on the question. The entire question of reorganization of the army may be broached in the senate.
