ACCOMODATIONS INADEQUATE

At Cavite the Supply of Medicine Was at One Time Exhausted The Conditions Are Being Improved.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2-The Associ ated Press has received the following orrespondence, dated Manils, October 5: The health of the troops here at prest w is far from being good, notwithstanding the statements of the medical department to the contrary. At Cavite conditions are very bad. There have been over 49 deaths there since Heptember I, mostly from typhold. One-third of the officers of the Montana volunteer regiment is on the sick list, including a colonel and a lieutenant colonel. In one battery alone over 75 per cent of the men stationed there have been on the sick list within a

Hospital accommodations there are inadecuate. The supply of medicines was exhausted at one time, and for days there was nothing medicinally to administer to the patients. Now that the sanitary conditions are being looked after, improved

health records will follow. In Manila conditions are better. Much of the sickness of the past can be traced to the overcrowding of men while the proper quarters were being prepared. There have been nine cases of smallpox among the soldiers so far, six of which were fatal. No cases have been reported the past five days. The hospitals are being put in a scanttary condition.




