#### UNSCRUPULOUS CORRESPONDENT

New York Sun's Manila Man Says Unkind Things About the Second Oregon.

COLONEL SUMMERS' LETTER

Says the Correspondent Has Disregarded the Truth in Several instances Merritt Commends.

PORTLAND, Nov. 4.—Colonel O. Sum-mers, commanding the Second Oregon written a letter to the Oregonian, in which he stoutly denies the correctness of the sensational articles published in the New York Sun reflecting on the character of the officers and men of the Sec and Oregon regiment. Colonel Summers

"The man who wrote these articles is Oscor King Davis, special correspondent of the New York Sun and Harper's Weekly. This man Davis made the voyage with us in the Australia, and has been entertained by my officers, both on ship and since coming ashore, and treated as gentlemen would treat other gentlemen at all times. He saw nothing on board the Australia that could not have been seen on any other troopship, and there was nothing in the conduct of my regiment that was different from the conduct of other regiments, regulars not excepted. Our men were well fed and under as good discipline and had their quarters kept as clean as those of any regular regiment that has come to the Philippines.

"As a further indication of the unscrupulous character of this man who thus abused the hospitality of the Oregon regiment. I will state that, after the capture of Manija, he went into a Spanlard's house in the city, represented himself to be a lieutenant colonel of the United States army and undertook to take possession and drive out the family and it became my duty, as provost marshal to put him out of the house."

Colonel Summers also encloses letters from Major General Thomas M. Anderson and Major General Wesley Merritt highly commending the efficiency of the Second Oregon regiment during and after the fall of Manila.

The Sun correspondent also wrote that while at the island of Guam several members of the Oregon regiment forcibly took several valuable articles from a pative, Colonel Summers says of this incident:

#### **PORTO RICANS** DISSATISFIED

Growing Indifference Between Natives and United States Troops on the Island.

NATIVES NOT TREATED RIGHT

General Stone Says Our Soldlers Were Cordially Welcomed to Island, but They Did Not Reciprocate.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.-General Roy Stone, who has just returned from Port Rico, says;

"The people of Porto Rico are not all satisfied wit American rule. There is a growing difference between the natives and the militia, which is greatly to be regretted. When the army of occupation first invaded the island, the natives received the Americans cordially and they wished to be treated as people province. The treatment they have received from our hands has been just the opposits. This has produced a chill. What the Porto Ricans want is to be taken in as a part of the United States. 
