"FIERCE" DUEL NEAR VIENNA

Notorious Herr Wolff and a Polish Deputy Cross Swords for Blood.

NEITHER DUELIST IS HURT

The Pole Became Rattled and Slashed Savagely, but Was Parried and Scratched by His Adversary.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—The Times says: Julio Carriz, formerly 'charge d'affaires' from the Argentine republic to this country, and recently diplomatic representative of Argentine in other countries, is now in the city on a brief visit. He left Buenos Ayres two and a half months ago, and at that time he said business conditions were improving very rapidly. In his opinion his country now offers excellent opportunity for United States enterprise and capitalists who believe in the future of Argentina, which is an admirer of American character and institutions. Mr. Carriz expresses a desire to see closer relations develop between the two countries. "The people of my country have a very friendly feeling for the United States," said Mr. Carriz. "Considerable machinery from the United States, has found its way to the United States, and the people there like it. In my opinion this is an admirable time for the United States to extend its trade to my country. Argentina has passed through a financial crisis and the fact that business conditions are steadily improving there is shown by the rapid decrease in the premium on gold. When I left there three months ago, there was a premium of 70 on gold. Now the premium is down to about 27. "General Biosa and the entire present administration is progressive, and soon there will be a demand for new railroads to develop the southern part of the republic. American capital might find a profitable employment in building these railroads. "It seems to me that there should be a direct and regular line of American steamships between New York and Argentina ports. Such a line would naturally be a great advantage to American merchants, and I believe that eventually it would pay well. At first, no doubt, it would be necessary to subsidize it, but that could be done in the way of a government postal subsidy. "At present there is no American line of ships between your country and Argentina. The British has several regular lines to the French, the Germans, the Italians and even the Spanish. "I have heard more or less talk about establishing an American bank in Argentina. That would be a good idea for us, and it would foster trade relations between the people of the two countries. Of course we do not need American capital, as there is an abundance of British capital in our country. All of our railroads thus far have been built with British capital. "A few Americans have started into business in the Argentine republic and they are doing well. There could not be a much better field to work. In a territory with a population of 4,000,000 we were able to export in 1907 goods to the value of \$16,000,000. This same territory is capable of supporting 200,000,000 people. "I think that the southern part of the republic is going to be the new Argentina. That section has a cooler climate, wonderfully fertile soil, and is free from locusts, which have been such a damage plague in the northern part of the republic."

TERESA STILL FLOATS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Officials at the navy department were interested in the news from Nassau identifying clearly the wreckage lying off Cat island as the Marie Teresa. The legal status of the vessel has been considered cursorily and in the opinion of the department the title of the United States to her is undisputed, notwithstanding that it was necessary to abandon her for a time.

AMERICAN MURDERED AT KOREA

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11.—The Belgic brings the news of a murder which occurred in Korea just before she sailed from Yokohama. George Lake, an American, was a storekeeper at Chemulpo. He was found dead with an ugly hole in his skull. A long blade with a heavy weight at the end of it was found by the side of the body. Deputy United States Consul J. C. Sands was investigating the murder when the Belgic sailed.

The fever situation at Havana is conceded to be very serious, and the administration is cognizant of the necessity of a thorough sanitary overhauling of the city before its occupation by our troops is safe.

The amount will be raised by subscription and during her lifetime the income from the fund will be paid to Mrs. Waring.

RETURNS BLOW IN DAKOTA

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—A special to the Times-Herald from Sioux Falls, S. D., says: From present indications it looks as if the constitutional amendment on equal suffrage, initiative and referendum and state dispensaries has carried in North Dakota. Nothing positive is likely to be known, though, until Saturday, as only half the counties has thus far reported on these features of the election.

COPPER MINE BURNS

Houghton, Mich., Nov. 11.—The Atlantic copper mine, four miles west of Houghton, is on fire. The 200 miners at work all escaped to the surface in time. The months of the shaft have been covered with timber and dirt and the fire will be smothered which may require only a few days or may take several weeks. Five hundred employes are thrown out of work.

JAPANESE MINISTER ARRIVES

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 11.—Junzo Kuroda, the newly appointed minister from Japan to the United States, has arrived here with his suite, en route to Washington. He is a graduate of the Harvard law school. He says that Japan is satisfied with the steps this country is taking in the Philippines.

TAMMANY NOT RESPONSIBLE

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—Richard Crocker said when he heard that some one was to try and contest Colonel Roosevelt's eligibility for the presidency for doing "Tammany Hall" has nothing to do with any such scheme. We fought Colonel Roosevelt at the polls. The returns say that he is elected. We know nothing of any such intention ascribed by some anonymous men of the organization. We are not behind it and will not stand for it.

HOLD-UPS IN IDAHO

LEWISTON, Idaho, Nov. 11.—Fred Gaylor and R. A. Bellick were held up on the road between Lewiston and Lapwai last night and robbed of \$17 and \$24 respectively.

COLFAX, Wash., Nov. 11.—Frank Brown, Frank Bowman, and Dan Greenberg, of Colfax; Dan Dunn, a Florence miner, and Ben Gaines, a Camas Prairie stockman, were held up and robbed by a lone highwayman near Lewiston yesterday morning. The robber made each man leave his valuables in the road and pass on.

MILES BANQUETTED

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—A complimentary banquet was given to Major General Miles, commanding the United States army at the Waldorf-Astoria tonight, which, in point of numbers, extensive preparation and brilliancy, rivalled the great banquet given last year in honor of President McKinley by the merchants and manufacturers. Seven hundred persons were present.

MANY PRISONERS FOR HAVANA

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Nov. 11.—The Spanish steamer Isla del Pinar, from Cadix, arrived here today, with 22 political prisoners on board, bound for Havana. The prisoners left the African penal settlement of Ceuta, October 25. They have served sentences of from two to three years' imprisonment.

DIED AT HAVANA

HAVANA, Nov. 11.—William Williams, chief quartermaster, and F. T. Stewart, a clerk attached to the quartermaster's department, died of fever this morning. It is a strange coincidence that the only cases of yellow fever among foreigners here lately have been those of members of the American commission and staff.

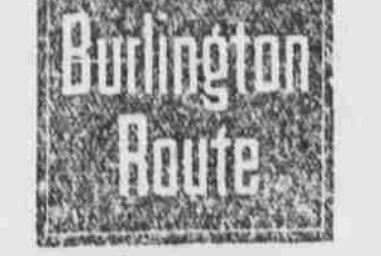
ARRIVED FROM MANILA

PLUMBER FAILS

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—William Bryan, plumber, has filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy, with liabilities of \$128,000 and no assets.

THE REPUBLIC IS PROSPEROUS

Business Booming in Argentina and a Brilliant Future is Predicted for It.

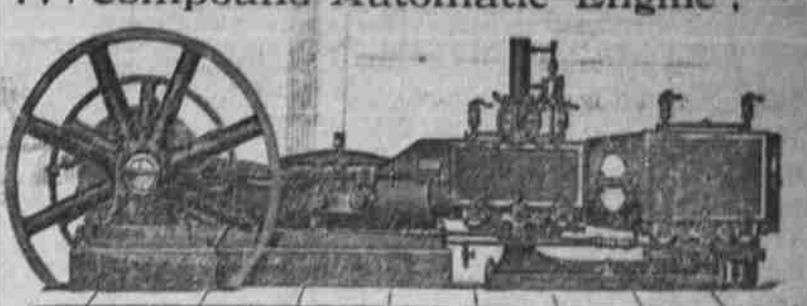
FIELD FOR OUR CAPITAL

Sentiment of the People There Generally Favorable to United States—Steamship Line a Necessity.

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—A dispatch to the World from London says:

The Vienna correspondent of the Mail telegraph: A fierce duel between the notorious Herr Wolff and the Polish deputy, Chevalier De Gniezow, is the sensation of the hour here. The cause of the duel was Wolff's remark on Tuesday's sitting of the Reichsrath that the Poles are a swarm of parasites sucking the lifeblood of the Austrian nation. The insult aroused the anger of the Polish deputies, who rose as one man and made for Wolff. The latter was quickly surrounded by a ring of German deputies and a sharp tussle ensued between the representatives of the two nationalities, in the course of which Wolff was badly knocked about by the Poles. When the storm subsided, De Gniezow declared in behalf of the Polish party that it repudiated with scorn the "insults of a street cad like Wolff." Wolff immediately challenged De Gniezow. The latter selected swords and the duel was fought today under life or death conditions. When the word of command was given the two deputies began a fierce combat, thrusting and parrying with a rapidity which was bewildering. De Gniezow, carried away by rage, directed blow after blow at his adversary. Wolff carried the wild onslaughts with cool judgment, and within five minutes caught his rival off his guard and wounded him in two places. De Gniezow's head was cut to the bone while a part of his right hand was hanging by the skin. But in spite of his serious injuries and the umpire's command to cease, De Gniezow still followed his adversary, slashing at him savagely until his own seconds seized and disarmed him. He was removed to his office and wrote a leading article. And it came to pass that Dr. Chasney M. Dewey contracted the golf fever. He is now practicing on the Ardsley links and a learned commentator says that he "reels off the rings of the game with an accent calculated to fool a native of Edinburgh."
