THE PEACE PROTOCOL.

The state department has lately made public the full text of the protocol be tween the United States and Spain for the preliminary settlement of the war, The copy heretofore published in this was a translation cabled from form to be given out. In view of the controversies between the American and mish commissions turning on the question of construing the language of this important document its actual form is just now of special interest. The proto

Protocol of agreement between the United States and Spain, embodying the terms of a basis for the establishment of a treaty of peace between the two

PROTOCOL.

William R. Day, Secretary of State of the United States, and his excellency. Jules Cambon, ambassador extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of the republic of France at Washington, respectively possessing for this purpose full authority from the government of the United States and the government of ain, have concluded and signed the following articles, embodying the terms upon which the two governments have agreed in respect to the matters hereinafter set forth, having in view the establishment of peace between the two coun-

Article I-Spain will relinquish all claim of sovereignty over the title to Cuba. Article II-Spain will cede to the United States the Island or Porto Rico and other islands now under Spanish sovereignty in the West Indies, and also an island in the Ladrones to be selected by the United States.

Article III-The United States will oc y and hold the city, bay and harbor of Manila pending the conclusion of a treaty of peace which shall determine the control, disposition and government

Article IV-Spain will immediately evacuate Cuba, Porto Rico and other is lands under Spanish sovereignty in the West Indies; and to this end each government will, within ten days after the signing of this protocol, appoint commission ers, and the commissioners so appointed shall within thirty days after the sign ing of this protocol, meet at Havana for purpose of arranging and carrying he details of the aforesaid evacuation of Cubs and the adjacent Spanish islands, and each government will with in ten days after the signing of the protocot, appoint other commissioners, who shall, within thirty days after the signing of this protocol, meet at San Juan, in Porto Rico, for the purpose of arranging and carrying out the details of the aforesaid evacuation of Porto Rico and other islands now under Spanish sovereignty in the West Indies.

Article V-The United States and Spain will each appoint not more than five commissioners to treat of peace, and the ommissioners so appointed shall meet Paris not later than October I, 1898, and proceed to the negotiation and conclusion of a treaty of peace, which treaty shall be subject to ratification according to the respective constitutional forms of the two countries.

Article VI-Upon the conclusion and signing of this protocol hostilities between the two countries shall be suspended, and notice to that effect shall be given as soon as possible by each government to the commanders of its milltary and naval forces. Dope at Washington in duplicate, in
