

THIS NEW YORK MAN'S FACE TO BE CHANGED. The Original "Front" Was Shot Away, But Modern Physicians Will Make Another One For Him.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The surgeons connected with H. Catherin's hospital in the borough of Brooklyn have in prospect a task which is likely to attract world-wide attention.

John Wagonblast, a few days ago, while carefully handling a shot gun, blew off the front and left side of his face. The doctors are planning to build him an artificial face by what is known as plastic surgery. The work will be in charge of Dr. J. C. Kennedy, visiting surgeon at the hospital, and Dr. James Stavin, the house surgeon.

Burgeon Stavin says: "The first step will be to replace the nose by one of rubber or celluloid. We shall draw up the skin on either side of the nose now so that it will slightly overlap the edges."

"The cheek bone and the bone over the eye will be replaced by plates of silver or platinum. We hope to be able to use the old roof of the mouth without any plates and to save the teeth. When once we can get the nose and plate in place and the process of healing has advanced we will begin grafting skin on the bare surface. This skin will take from the man's thighs."

"It will require a long time and much patience on the part of the suffering man, but we hope to make a respectable job of him before we are through. The last step will be to replace the lost eye with one of glass."

GENERAL WOOD PROHIBITS GAMBLING AT SANTIAGO. Heavy Penalties Imposed on Gambling of All Kinds, Which Was Carried on Everywhere.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—A dispatch to the Herald from Santiago says: General Wood has issued an order prohibiting gambling in any form in Santiago, with a penalty of \$100 for the infraction of the law. Up to the present time roulette and roulette and card games of every description was played publicly in the clubs and saloons and in the camps. The San Carlos Club was the resort of Cubans and Americans, who spent their evenings gambling at the baccarat table. Among the Cubans were some American officers, and betting was carried on everywhere.

Under the Spanish regime gambling was a national institution, and as the fanaticism of the play caused considerable embarrassment to American soldiers. General Wood took the action. Cuban betters had been with military men and protested, but a strict observance of it has been enforced.

SANTIAGO IS CLEAN. WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—General Wood, commanding the department of Santiago, has sent an official report to the war department, of which the following is an extract:

SPANISH COMMISSIONERS HAVE REFUSED TO ACCEDE. United States Will Not, However, Recede From the Position Assumed by Our Peace-Makers.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—A special meeting of the cabinet was held at 10 o'clock tonight. The meeting was called by the president in order that his advisers might consider with him the advice received this evening from the American peace commissioners at Paris. It is understood the advice referred to counter-proposals informally made to the Americans by the members of the commission of the Madrid government.

At the conclusion of the meeting, which lasted only 40 minutes, Secretary May said to a representative of the Associated Press that the President had received some advice from Paris that he desired to say before the cabinet, and that he had called the members together to consider them. The nature of the advice May declined to discuss, saying that was a matter which could not be gone into for publication at this time. He added, however, after considering the contents of the dispatch, the president has called the American commissioners, reiterating his former instructions.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGE. NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—Pacific maintained their recent dropping tendency, pending the result of further consultations between Northern Pacific and Oregon Navigation authorities looking to an adjustment of the dispute over the division of territory. It was significant that stocks of other railroads vitally interested in the controversy were inclined to advance. Union Pacifics were strong, common gaining 1/4 and Oregon Short Line rose over a point. Great Northern, on the other hand, lost a point.

NO FEAR OF SILVERITES. NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—R. G. Dun's Weekly Review will say: "Thanksgiving day in 1887 means more than for 50 years. The 'harvest home' has never recognized larger crops or the whole in this country and general prosperity is attained in the history of business ever recorded, and the people's verdict has given reason to hope that the soundness of the currency and the nation's honor will not again be in peril. Failures for the week have been 18 in the United States, against 26 last year, and 21 in Canada, against 25 last year."
