A HEFTY CRITICISM

In Sunday's Oregonian a gentleman, or an alleged gentleman, over the signature of "J. B. M.," attempts to answer letter III of "A Portland Business Man." Its ungentlemanly manner of discussing this great problem, together with its abuse and vituperation, suggests the author to be the man who is "building a castle for the storage of vanishing wheat," as our Portland correspondent phrases it, and who has suddenly realized the folly of his enterprise.

He conceals that the problem is one of cheap chartering arising from heavy ocean tonnage. But he intimates that the heaviest ships of ocean commerce can go up to Portland. He gives our Portland correspondent the lie as to his statement that the Atlantic liners range from 27 to 35 feet of draught. He says:

This is an egregious error. None of these liners have a draft of 27 feet, or even 27 feet. I crossed on two of the largest Hamburg steamers—the Columbia and the Augusta Victoria. They are 4,000 tons each. I asked the captain of the former steamer what draft she had. He said, "35 feet and with a full cargo 35 feet."

But in fact the four steamers of the Hamburg line, the Columbia, Normania, Augusta Victoria and Faust Bismarck, are each of "27 feet draught, loaded," and have a "gross tonnage of 4,000 to 5,000 tons" as stated in a paper prepared January 1, 1935, for the Society of Railroad Engineers, by Archibald A. Schenck, principal assistant engineer of the New York Central. Most likely "J. B. M." was so full of his prospective meeting with Baron Rothschild, Lord Fildeshtelski and Lady Random that he misunderstood the captain. If our correspondent had been mistaken the Oregonian would have pounced upon that vital error in a moment.

It is no wonder the editor hid "J. B. M.'s" letter on an out-of-the-way page. "J. B. M.'s" letter, by making an untenable issue, has conceded the soundness of our Portland correspondent's argument. Will the Oregonian itself now undertake to refute that argument?
