His three older brothers are on these boards, but each has some interest to which he devotes his special attention. George J. Gould is especially active in the management of the Missouri Pacific system.

Frank J. Gould is, like his brother George, an expert telegrapher, and has always taken an active part in the Western Union Telegraph Company, and it is believed that he will turn his attention chiefly to the affairs of that corporation.

NATIONAL GUARD MAY SOON BE REORGANIZED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Colonel Marsh, chairman of the committee on militia, is determined to look after the interests of the National Guard, and will in the future take up a bill which is introduced at the last session for the reorganization of the National Guard or draft a new one which will conform with the changes to be made in the formation of the regular army.

Colonel Marsh is a firm believer in the theory that the militia should be organized on the same basis as the army, so as to avoid in the future any mistakes and drawbacks which were met with during the war just ended.

TICKET-SCALPING BILL PASSED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—The house today passed the anti-ticket-scalping bill by a vote of 119 to 101. This action is the culmination of a 18-year struggle on the part of the railroads to put an end to the business of ticket-scalping.

CUBAN TARIFF.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Dec. 7.—United States Customs Commissioner Robert P. Porter arrived here from Cuba yesterday and called for home today. Mr. Porter has framed a Cuban tariff which will be promulgated on his arrival here. It opens the Cuban market to all nations on equal terms.

MACRO'S DEATH MEMORIZED.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, Dec. 7.—Today is the anniversary of the death of General Antonio Maceo, and it has been celebrated among Cubans in Santiago. The memorial service was held this morning at the cathedral, which was crowded. Less than two years ago the same cathedral witnessed the Te Deum sung by the same choir in the cathedral of Mexico's death. Then the center of the world was in Spanish colors. Today the draped was in black, interspersed with a few Cuban emblems.

BIG FIRE AT LOS ANGELES.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7.—The careless handling of a lighted match by an employee of the Standard Oil Company caused a fire this afternoon in the company's works, located on the river bank in East Los Angeles, which completely destroyed the company's property, resulting in a loss of about \$100,000, with no insurance.

Shortly after loading his wagon from a tank of benzine the driver lit his pipe and carelessly threw a lighted match on the ground. An explosion immediately followed, the wagon caught fire and the frightened horses dashed from the place, not, however, until the flames had been communicated to a 1,000-gallon tank. The whole building was soon ablaze, the succession of explosions quickly spreading the flames over the whole works. The fire was confined to the property of the oil company, where it burned itself out.
