

DISCONTENT GROWING OVER MILITARY APPOINTMENTS

Politicians squabbling over Gen. Brooke's Selections—Evening Social Promenade Popular—Other News.

Correspondence of the Associated Press. SAN JUAN DE PORTO RICO, Dec. 15.—The past week in San Juan has shown certain developments in the general situation of the island, and drifting straws have been seen which indicate the current of a growing discontent.

There has been much trouble all over the island since the American government assumed a military protectorate concerning the appointment of mayors and councilmen in the different municipalities, of which there are all in 72. Men so appointed and those already in office have been resigning and squabbling among themselves and expressing their displeasure at the appointment of some colleagues.

The fact that General Brooke declined to grant to the council of Ponce the privilege of the autonomist constitution which they were arrogating to themselves is what rankles and is ever present in the minds of the defeated autonomists. The accordance of this privilege would have been for them a great victory.

The best judgment here sustains Brooke in this action. If the privilege was granted to one council it would have to be granted to all and each one of Porto Rico's 72 municipalities, acting with the power and latitude contemplated by the autonomist platform, would have brought much confusion to the island.

The autonomist party sets up a prolonged howl of discontent in which, among other things, they declared that Munoz Rivera, leader of General Brooke's cabinet, had betrayed them inasmuch as he had used his influence to bring about the decision against their demands. Munoz is an element of political discord. Six months ago he theatrically declared he would die wrapped in the flag of Spain, and he was the first Porto Rican to swear allegiance to the United States.

He is the greatest necessary man on the island since October 13th, the head of General Brooke's advisory board and the insular affairs. He is a capable man and a scholar. He probably long ago determined to become the political ruler of Porto Rico.

The other members of the cabinet are Hernandez Lopez, Salvador Carbonel and Dr. Coli y Tost. These men, with the exception of Dr. Tost, who was recently appointed on the resignation of Julian Blanco, former secretary of the treasury, have been General Brooke's advisors since October 13th, and the followers of the same party as Munoz, and they owe much to Munoz in the past.

General Brooke was necessarily dependent on these men in forming opinions on local affairs, consequently it was possible for them in a measure to influence his judgment.

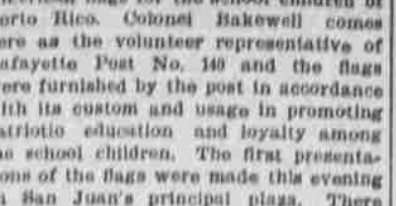
There is a mild mannered man named Inglesias in Porto Rico who is called a socialist and anarchist. He advocated an eight hour day; that the state should maintain women for a period preceding and following child birth and similar duties. He works in the interests of labor. He brought about strikes among the working classes for higher wages; he had been imprisoned under Spain and he is in prison today. The recent strike among the typesetters in San Juan for an increase in wages was his doing.

His day seems to be more American than the other old charges against Inglesias. There are some time during Spanish control in which it is said he maligned Munoz and the government of Spain. Soon after the typesetters struck Inglesias was summoned before Munoz and ordered by him to leave the island for good.

Inglesias positively declined to do. Soon after he and the editor of a paper who supported him were in jail, where they have now been for five days without trial of charges being preferred.

Such measures strongly remind the Porto Ricans of the old days of Spanish rule, and the cases mentioned are not the only ones of arbitrary imprisonment without the preference of charges. General Brooke is about to leave Porto Rico. He has had much to contend with here and while his health is good he is much worried by the cases mentioned above. The best element in Porto Rico are busy to their efforts in their behalf and are sorry to see him go.

UPROAR IN LOWER HOUSE. PARIS, Dec. 12.—In the chamber of deputies today M. Groussot, radical socialist, interpellated the government on the instruction of the general staff in the Dreyfus affair. He read extracts from newspaper articles which are alleged to have emanated from members of the general staff, which caused violent uproar, during which the deputies rose and rushed at one another and engaged in a series of fist fights.

THIS BILL SHOULD PASS. WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Representative Hepburn, of Iowa, today introduced a bill authorizing the president to acquire by purchase from the states of Costa Rica and Nicaragua, full ownership, jurisdiction and sovereignty of such land as may be desirable and necessary to construct and defend the ship canal. The president is also directed to construct such canal and the bill appropriates \$10,000,000 to complete it.

ORDINANCE WILL NOT PASS. CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—The ordinance extending the franchises of Chicago street car companies for 50 years came up in the city council tonight and was referred to the council committee on railroads. On all votes touching the ordinance the friends of the measure were stronger in the minority, and unless they can muster such greater strength, there is no probability that they will ever be able to pass it over the veto of Mayor Harrison.

SETTLEMENT LIKELY. NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Dispatches from Tacoma detailing the alleged activity of the Northern Pacific in preparing to purchase the Oregon Navigation Company's feeders in that state were discredited today by banking interests in touch with the properties concerned, and it was said that matters are going forward to a settlement as fast as can be expected another conference to that end having been arranged for this week.

"KICKS" APPOINTEE THROWN OUT. PORTLAND, Dec. 12.—Collector of Customs L. A. Macdonald has notified that his appointment of John M. Minto as his position of deputy in his office a month ago will not be approved on account of Minto not having passed the civil service examination. It is understood that some of the employees of the internal revenue office will lose their positions for the same reason.

FLIMMER KNOCKED OUT. LONDON, Dec. 12.—At the National Sporting Club this evening there was a spirited bout between Neddy Palmer and Billy Flimmer for the bantam championship. The National Sporting Club gave a purse and the fight was for \$200 a side. Palmer knocked Flimmer out in the seventh round.

BURGE LOST DECISION. NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, Eng., Dec. 12.—Bobby Dobbs, the American, beat Dick Burge in a contest here tonight for a purse of £20 and £300 a side. In the eighth round Burge claimed a foul, which the referee refused to allow. Burge's backer thereupon declined to allow him to continue the fight.

HAS TOO MANY WIVES. CLEVELAND, Dec. 12.—At the union ministers' meeting, held here today, resolutions were adopted denouncing the election of Brigham H. Roberts as a member of the house of representatives from Utah because he belongs to the Mormon faith.
