Alexander Campbell, one of the best known men in the state of Oregon, died yesterday morning at his home in this city from neuralgia of the heart and complaint, complicated with liver Bright's disease, Mr. Campbell had been ill for the past five months, and about three months ago went to Without Springs for the benefit of his health. He remained there for six weeks, and returned apparently slightly improved. However, he did not leave the house, and gradually sank.


