Meat Packers Preparing to Erect Large Cold Storage Plants in Several Cuban Cities-Locations Being Selected.

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.-The Record says: Chicago capitalists will spend large amount of money in erecting immense cold storage plants in Santiago, Havana nad Porto Rico for the reception and storing of fresh meat. Within a fortnight cold storage experts will be sent to West Indian cities to look over ground. prepare plans and specifications for the
