The British ship Rothwell, 14 days from San Francisco, in ballast, arrived yesterday. The Rothwell arrived off the river Sunday last and experienced the gale that night, which took her far out to sea. The latter part of the week the Rothwell sighted the lights, but no fog being in sight, stood off to sea until one was picked up yesterday morning. She received quick dispatch and left for Portland in tow of the Hayward in the evening.

season's grain fleet entering the harbor under similar conditions, and the Najade is one of the very few vessels which have ever sailed into the river without a pilot or tug. The Najade sailed in with almost a fair wind and smooth sea and anchored near Sand Island. The feat of the Najade is nothing more than what could be accomplished here frequently, providing, of course, shipmasters took into consideration that the mouth of the river is less dangerous now than it was in former years.

The American ship Tillo E. Starbuck arrived down from Portland yesterday, loaded with a general cargo of merchandise for Hilo, Hawaii, etc., and the different consignments of merchandise the Starbuck has on board 24,754 feet of Oregon pine lumber, and she carries oats, barley, bran, hay, apples, potatoes and lime, which make up the greater portion of the commodities that are in demand among the natives of the islands. The Starbuck cleared at the customs house yesterday and is ready to sail.

Through an unfortunate error in the headlines over a telegraphic item from New York, published in the Astorian a few days ago, Payne Strahan, Moore, who was on trial there for robbery, was made to appear as the daughter of Justice Moore, of the Oregon supreme bench. Of course, a perusal of the article would at once make it plain that an error had been made, but the unfortunate circumstances might have caused the popular Oregon justice some annoyance, and for this reason the correction is made. It is perhaps needless to add that Payne Strahan Moore is the daughter of the late Justice Strahan, of Oregon.

Messrs. John E. Gratre, of the Budget, and E. B. Sover, of the Astorian, as judges of the candle guessing match, met at Herman Wick's store at 5 last evening and took charge of all the guesses before the candle was lighted. The guesses were put into a large envelope, which was then sealed and the judges put their names across the seal. Mr. Gratre then put the envelope containing the guesses into his safe, where it will remain until after the candle is completely burned out, when the judges will canvass the guesses and award the three presents to the closest guessers.

William Schoek, a prominent farmer of Adams county, Rural City, Idaho, has presented Colonel Hughes of this city, with a fine turkey for his Christmas dinner. The bird arrived in due course of express yesterday, and was a source of admiration and wonder to Colonel Hughes' many friends during the day. It is believed to be the largest and fattest turkey ever exhibited in Astoria. It is beautifully dressed and is plucked with a care and cleanliness unusual to Oregon fowls. Colonel Hughes states that it was corn fed and its beauty and plumpness bear satisfactory testimony to that effect, around all whose privilege it has been to taste and appreciate that deficiency in poultry peculiar to other climates.

TWO SOLDIERS CHARGED WITH ATTEMPTED RAPE.

James J. Hudson and C. F. Adams Now Locked Up in the County Jail on a Serious Charge.

James J. Hudson and C. F. Adams, two regulars stationed at Fort Stevens, were charged with the serious crime of attempted rape last night.

The men were arrested yesterday afternoon by Constable Wickman, on a charge sworn to by Fritz Reisk, a resident of New Astoria. The alleged intended victim of the men is Mrs. Erickson, of New Astoria.

According to the story of the complaining witness, the soldiers entered the room in which Erickson and his wife reside and drove out the inmates. The woman was compelled to run along the beach, where the soldiers are said to have attempted to sexually assault her. The men are said to have been under the influence of liquor at the time, and it is also charged against them that they committed depredations in other places the same night.

Hudson and Adams were taken before Justice Hughes yesterday afternoon. He bound them over in \$100 bail, which they were unable to furnish. In lieu of the bail they were committed to the county jail. The preliminary examination of the men is set for Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock in the justice's court.

The men are regulars and have been members of battery M, Third artillery, for some time past. One formerly resided in Portland, where his parents now live, and the other is from California.

The men deny that they attempted to assault Mrs. Erickson. They admit they were intoxicated, and that they drove out the inmates. They contend that this action was mere a feature of their "lark," and that they had no intention of assaulting the woman. They are very much distressed over their arrest on the serious charge, the penalty for which is a long term in the penitentiary.

TORPEDO-BOAT DAVIS OFF FOR MARIE ISLAND.

Trim Little Vessel Sailed Yesterday Morning and Will Make Eighteen Knots an Hour.

The torpedo-boat Davis left for Marie Island yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, and is now well on her way down the coast. Quite a crowd collected along the docks to see the trim little vessel off her voyage, and to wish her officers and crew a merry Christmas and a pleasant passage.

The Davis is in command of Captain Thomas Neal, of this city. Her chief engineer is F. Wolfram, who is assisted by Arthur Bartholomew, formerly of this city. All told there are 25 men on board, all but two of whom, Captain Neal and a boatwain, are from the Wolf & Zwicker iron works. J. E. Wolf, son of the senior member of the firm, and vice-president, and Arthur Zwicker, treasurer of the works, accompany the Davis on her trip south.

It is expected by the officers that the torpedo-boat will make about 15 knots an hour on the trip to San Francisco. If this speed is maintained, and no accident occurs, the Davis will be in San Francisco at 10 tonight. The weather was quite calm when the vessel put to sea yesterday, and it is not likely that she will experience any trouble. Her trip down the river was most satisfactory to her officers, and the engines were kept running from the time she pulled out from the works until she was moored at Flavel's wharf.

The Davis is drawing six feet aft and about five feet forward, and will ride the waves, taking but little water. She is the first deep-sea instrument built in the northwest to sail from a port north of San Francisco, and it is to be hoped she will reach her destination in safety. Upon her arrival at Marie Island her officers and men will return to the Portland works.

The trial trip of the Fox, the Davis' sister ship, was held a few days ago, and the boat ran very smoothly. Not the slightest hitch occurred on the run, and the boilers were delighted with her performance. The official trial trip of the Fox has not yet taken place. The firm has displayed great enterprise in bidding for and securing the construction of these boats, and although Messrs. Wolf & Zwicker have lost considerable money on the contract, they have demonstrated to the government that wharves may be built on the Columbia river.
