LEOPOLD COHN'S PROTEST

Has Acquainted President McMinty With the Conditions and Will Write Other Roted Men.

violence toward the Jews in the While the city's indebtedriess, as shown poorer quarters of Manhattan and Brooklyn, was made the subject of a lengthy letter sent on New Year's day to President McKinley by Leopold Cohn, of Brooklyn.

The writer was once a Jewish rabbi, but was converted to Christian belief seven years ago in this city and joined the Baptist church. He is now conducting missionary work among the people of his race, and has charge of three

Mr. Cohn, in this communication to the president, states that in the prosecution of his missionary work he has continually thrust upon his notice the everincreasing hatred displayed in this city toward the Jew, until he has found it his imperative duty to sound a note of warning. The letter continues:

"Peaceful Jews walking the streets of this city are habitually called by opprobrious epithets, or are loudly hooted and insulted, as though they were mounteto recognize meritorious conduct on the banks or criminals, and when the threat. par of the people's servants, regardless ening shout will not attract response, then the throwing of mud and stones is remorted to, and I repeat, not in an isolated instance, but constantly as the weeks pass, and as a result of which

> "When a street car passes through the Jowish quarter, hosting, histing and overfue. calling of names from its platforms are customary incidents, and within these public cars I have seen Jews pulled by the beards and pushed from one man to another and back again like a football, in which horse play the conductors themsulves have participated, and in some cases, which I am ready to prove, have teemed as a legitimate object to be mobbed and robbed,

"On one occasion, I saw a Jewish ped. dier with horse and wagon set upon by a mob of large boys with stones, the man trying to protect himself by drawing his coat up over his head. On running to his defense, I was myself attacked; on appealing to a group of citicens, and admitting, upon their questioning, that the victim was a Jew, they laughed boister. ously, adding, with evident smeer, that I was myself of the same race; and upon appealing to a policeman, he coolly re. plied, after great deliberation, that the affair was not on his beat. In the meantime, with head bleeding, the peddler embellishments, exploiting the was driven from his wagon, which was looted and overturned.
