AFTERNOON SESSION.

In the matter of committee clerkships, the house this afternoon showed itself more willing than the senate to reform the practice that has brought such gen. eral condemnation upon the Oregon legis. lature. The joint resolution reported by he committee appointed at the special session to consider the question passed the house by a vote of 41 to 17; but in the senate the opponents of the measure were unable to send it to the committee on education, after a long debate, directed entirely at the merits of the resolu. The vote on the reference was 19 to 19. Dr. Kuykundall, chairman of the committee, gave assurance that the smmittee would take the matter up

omptly and report on it. Two alternatives were presented after he session's action on the main resolution became known, one in each house, apply to its own branch.

Curtis' resolution authorizing the em yment of one clerk for each committee of the house was made a special order in the house for tomorrow morning. Kelly's esolution authorizing the appointment of 5 committee clerks for the senate went o the committee on education without eing rejected, the understanding being that the committee would choose between that and the one previously referred to These alternatives are based on secion 11 of article 4, which provides that such house shall determine its own rules of proceeding. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2.- The Singa. pore Free Press says that Spencer Pratt, consul general of the United States, has sent to General Otis, milltary governor at Manila, a proposal that a memorial should be crected at Manila to the memory of all Americans who fell in the capture or died of disease during the campaign. FREIGHT CARS COLLIDE.

BELLEVILLE, Mich., Jan. 2 .- A disastrous freight wreck has been caused on the Wabash here by freight train No. 60 running into the rear end of an extra freight that was lying on the main track near Harvey Johnson's bean storehouse, The engineer and fireman saved them selves by jumping. An overturned stove fired the wreck and five treight oars, the caboose and the bean storehouse were burned and the wrecked engine was badly damaged by the fire. The loss on ing stock is estimated at \$20,006, with \$3,000 loss on the storehouse.
