WELCOMED IN
THE INTERIOR

Cubans Extend a Cordial Reception to the Americans in the Provinces.

THE VISIT OF GENERAL LEE

Military Governor Explains to the People of Guinne His Functions
Pay of Insurgents

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Havana says:

General Lee returned to camp tonight from a trip to the southeastern part of this province, ending at Guinees, which is the next largest town after Havana. The journey to Guinees was made with a team of mules, taking the highway, and the return by rail.

The battalion of the Fourth Illinois preceded General Lee and was encamped there upon his arrival. A battalion of the Second Louisiana reached Guinees before its departure. The American troops were welcomed everywhere and their presence was made the occasion of demonstrations.

General Lee received an enthusiastic welcome at Guinees. Insurgent troops escorted him, and the town was decorated with Cuban and American flags.

A public reception was given in the council chamber, of which General Lee took advantage to explain his functions, which he was delighted with as military governor of the province. He said he was exerting functions which pertained to a temporary military occupancy; that the American soldiers came as friends; that there was no disposition on the part of the United States government to interfere with the Cubans in the management of the affairs of the island; that its only purpose was to assist in the administration until the time when the people were ready to declare for themselves what their wishes were.

He counseled moderation of all classes toward one another and complimented the community on the good order which had been preserved. General Lee also explained how nations were being disengaged by direction of the president. He said their distress was fully understood and the American authorities hoped to adopt measures of permanent effect.

Regarding local affairs, General Lee said it was the policy of the American authorities to have the towns select as far as possible their own officials by getting together and indicating whom they desired. Then he would make appointments in conformity with their wishes. General Lee's speech was received in excellent spirit. Various petitions were presented to him. The Spanish colony in a formal document made known its satisfaction with the insurgent soldiers for preserving order.

The practice marches of the battalions have been quite beneficial and will be continued. General Lee has practically

decided to move a full brigade from its present camp near Havana to the hills of Candela. The location is unusually healthy.

Collector Bliss has written a letter to General Menocal requesting that he indicate definitely his preference among the Cubans recommended for place in the custom house. The understanding was that Menocal should endorse applicants so as to give a guarantee of applications satisfactory to the Cubans. Several hundred such endorsements have already been made and Menocal has so far refused to make more recommendations between individuals.

The Havana newspapers are all agitating the question of the payment of the insurgent troops. They want a definite plan adopted. As an expression of the wishes of the Cuban people, the papers reflecting Spanish sentiments support the position.

The transport Michigan arrived last night with 50 tons of refrigerated beef for the army. Unloading of a lighter began in a heavy rain and one-fourth of the beef was spoiled. The representative of Swift & Co. refuses to accept it for delivery to the troops, and the beef was thrown back on the government.

PRICE OF WHEAT ADVANCES

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—The bullish sentiment in wheat, which got so well under way yesterday, continued with increased energy at the opening today. Wheat leaped into the air with a buoyant skip at the very start and offerings were quoted at 18½c over yesterday's closing price.

Foreigners were largely short of May wheat here and in New York. One commission house that does a large foreign exchange business was reported to have called margin from European customers up to 50 cents a bushel. Many European shorts were sold to have sent orders to "buy in" wheat. The announcement of this caused the greatest excitement, and as orders kept coming from all quarters to buy wheat, May shot up to 29c. That was a gain of ½c cents for the day, and as a majority of the traders had handsome profits coming, they took advantage of the excitement to secure them. The liquidation became so general that inside of 15 minutes May tumbled back to 27½ cents, but as quickly started on the upward again, closing at 27c.

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WOMEN WANT EQUAL SUFFRAGE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 26.—The right of the women in behalf of the proposed constitutional amendment granting equal suffrage has been begun in earnest in the legislature. About sixty positions from all parts of the state have been presented, the aggregate said to represent nearly 15,000 persons.

The great majority of the signers are women, but each position makes a fair showing for the opposite sex. The agents of the women's organization are still at work in all parts of the state, and those in charge of the movement say that 50,000 names will be submitted on petitions before the agitation closes.

MEXICAN METHODIST CHURCH

CHICAGO, Jan. 26.—A special to the Record from the City of Mexico says: Bishop McCabe and family have arrived here to attend the fifteenth annual conference of the Methodist church of Mexico, which meets today. Last night special service was held to commemorate the silver anniversary of the founding of the first mission in Mexico by the Rev. Dr. William Butler. The figures of the last year show that there are 200 workers, 30,000 adherents, and 300 Sunday school children in this republic. The valuation of the mission properties is \$50,000. The collections from native Methodists during the year were \$19,000. Three million pages of sacred literature have been published by the mission press during the year 1898.

Dr. Butler now lives at Newton Center, near Boston, and is 81 years of age.

TROOPS FOR MANILA ARRIVE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 26.—The Twentieth United States infantry regiment, the first battalion of which arrived here yesterday en route to Manila, came across the country in five sections. The second section arrived late last night and the others will arrive at intervals of a few hours. The last section is expected some time today. The troops which came in during the night sleep in their trains at the Oakland mole.
