HYPHENATED AMERICANS... Captain Coghlan Denounces Americans Who Retain Foreign Prefix to Their Citizenship... ADMIRAL DEWEY'S PLANS

CHICAGO, June 21.—A special to the Times-Herald from Terre Haute, Ind., says: Captain Coghlan, of the Raleigh, who stopped here on his way to Puget sound to visit friends of Mrs. Coghlan, and his wife, where they then young naval officer met his wife, who was a Miss Harbison 36 years ago, talked interestingly with those friends of the occurrences which have brought him into prominence, except as to the Union League club speech, with its recitation of "Hoch der Kaiser." That affair, he said, is a closed incident. He said that though he had a trunk full of letters received from all parts of the United States, only 15 were in criticism and of that 15 he wrote by very ignorant persons. The captain did speak with feeling against what he called "hyphenated Americans." Said he: "If a man is an American citizen, he is an American citizen, pure and simple. I have no patience with this hyphenated citizenship. There is nothing that Europe would rather see today than the existence of their factional lines in our citizenship. If these foreign colonists get a foothold in the United States our power will be on the wane."

HEAVEN'S LAW VIOLATED... Democratic Convention Gets Into An Upsur and Cannot Organize... LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 21.—The race for the democratic nomination for governor of Kentucky lies between Caud Stone and William A. Goebel. A combination of the followers of these two leaders tonight secured the organization of the convention in the election of David H. Rowline to be temporary chairman. The first law of heaven had little to do

with the regulation of today's proceedings of the democratic state convention. On the contrary, order gave place to great confusion and after sweltering through nearly eight hours of tedious hearing of contests the convention, without nominating a chairman, adjourned until evening, in a whirlwind of chairs, fans, tally sheets and reporters' copy. Fortunately no one was hurt. The feeling was at a high tension over the argument that was in progress before Chairman Johnson over the contested election from Kenton county, the home of William Goebel, one of the leading candidates for governor. Congressman Ellis, of the Sixth district, a venerable gentleman of much vehemence, was eloquently presenting Goebel's side of the case and was being interrupted at short intervals by noisy demonstrations of approval. A 20-pound rube, little the worse for his political and oratorical excitement, mounted a chair and challenged Major Johnson to carry out his threat, announcing incidentally that force would be necessary in his case. Quick as a flash Jim Williams started from the front of the stage for the intruder, his activity was a signal for a stampede towards exits. Almost everybody was standing on chairs when the affair occurred and the result was a general scramble to get out of the way of the general disarrangement of the furniture. Half a dozen men surrounded each of the belligerents and the disturber was hustled out of the hall.

ALL QUIET IN SAMOA... Natives Give Up Arms—Commissioners Recommend Kingship Be Abolished... APLIA, Samoa, June 21, via Auckland, N. Z., June 21.—Mataafa has surrendered 150 rifles and the loyalists have given up 250. After June 29 a heavy penalty will be enforced upon natives found with rifles in their possession. Mataafa promised to turn in more weapons. The natives have returned to their homes. Mālietā Tanu was recognized as king by the commissioners of the three powers and the decision of the chief justice, Chambers, in the matter of the kingship was proclaimed and binding. Mālietā Tanu then abdicated in favor of the commissioners, who appointed a provisional government, consisting of consuls of the three powers, empowering the majority to act in all cases where unanimity is not required by the Berlin treaty.

YUKON MOUTH TO BE SURVEYED... SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—The coast and geodetic survey steamer Patterson, as sailed for St. Michael to make a survey of that portion of Behring sea on the route to the Alaskan gold fields. A year ago systematic work was begun in this region. This year the reward approaches of the Yukon are to be developed. In connection with parties on small boats containing the tracking of the delta channels and their devious ways through the great bank to the deep water of the sea.

NO CHANGE IN ARMY RATION... WASHINGTON, June 21.—The board of officers appointed by General Brooke to investigate and make recommendations regarding the army ration have prepared their report, and it has been forwarded to the war department. No change is recommended in the ration itself, though a slight modification of the manner in which it may be used is suggested.

TOBACCO SEIZED... SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—Burt Thomas, of the internal revenue service, today seized 250,000 cigars and tobacco, valued at \$500, in the Capital cigar factory, the largest cigar factory in this city, for violation of the revenue laws.

WASHINGTON G. A. R. MEETS... SEATTLE, June 21.—The Grand Army of the Republic, department of Washington, and its allied societies of Women's Relief Corps and Sons of Veterans convened in annual session today. The day was devoted to organization and reports of committees and officers.

DISASTER IN THE PHILIPPINES

Dr. McQuesten, Late Health Officer at Manila, Makes Dire Predictions.

FAVORS NEGRO SOLDIERS

Says They Can Stand the Climate—He Praises the Volunteer Soldiers.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—Dr. Charles A. McQuesten, who was on the staff of General Oza and who was health officer at Manila, has returned home, invalided by the climate. Captain McQuesten made a close study of the conditions of the Philippine situation. He is of the opinion that it will take from 100,000 to 150,000 soldiers to properly subdue and hold the islands. He also says that the peace commission was an absolute failure, and that its work from the start was without effect. He strongly supports the military government of the islands, except that he thinks more men will be necessary than has been estimated.

Dr. Schurman knows that the commission is a failure and is coming home in July, added Captain McQuesten. "Unless soldiers, thousands of them, are sent to the aid of our men they will be driven back into Manila in the course of the next few months, during the rainy season. Our men simply cannot stand the climate. Fifty per cent of them will be incapacitated by sickness. Manila will be in a state of siege again. "One of the great dangers that our men have to face is the climate. The newcomers will be at a disadvantage because the volunteers who are returning home are acclimated to the climate. As a matter of belief, the Filipinos think they have the Americans licked already. "One solution of the situation might be to enlist colored troops from the Gulf states, and this might settle some of the race questions of that section. These men would be better able to stand the climate conditions around Manila, and it has been proven that they are good fighters. "I want to say a word for the western volunteers. They make the finest soldiers in the world, and their fighting qualities are wonderful. But the volunteers all want to turn home, and I hardly think that the plan to enlist three skeleton regiments from the volunteers now in the Philippines will be a success. The men enlisted to fight for their country, and they are not the kind of men who want to stay and fight an insurrection for money or the fun of fighting."

JUDGE FOSTER DEAD... TOPEKA, Kas., June 21.—C. G. Foster, former federal judge for the district of Kansas, died this evening. Judge Foster was appointed judge of the United States district court by President Grant in 1874, and served until March, this year, when he was retired and succeeded by W. C. Hook.
