NEW YORK, June 26—A special to the Herald from Washington says:

Major General Miles is an advocate of the dispatch of reinforcements to General Otis. He declined to discuss the political position in the Philippines other than to say it was serious, nor would he give any idea of the troops that should be sent to the Philippines to place the archipelago under American control.

General Miller's view coincides with General Lawson's and that of other officers subordinate to General Otis. In fact, in other than administration circles there is a disposition to believe that General Otis' estimate of the men required was made when he knew of the desire of the president not to raise volunteers if possible to avoid it.

MR. DELL NOT ENDORSED

Other Interesting Matters Up for Consideration at the Chamber of Commerce Last Night.

Unusual interest centered in the meeting of the chamber of commerce held last night, and notwithstanding the bad weather there was a good representation of the chamber present. The secretary opened the evening program by reading a communication from A. D. Chabron, general assistant passenger agent for the Northern Pacific, in answer to an application from the chamber saying that as yet nothing had been done in regard to giving immigrants or home seekers rates to Astoria.

The proposition of Corbett Bros., asking a site and bonus to establish a flouring mill in Astoria was read and the secretary instructed to ask for further information.

The committee on arrangements for entertaining the National Editorial Association reported that everything was progressing favorably and that the visiting editors would be shown the many points of interest in and around Astoria to the best advantage.

The committee appointed at the special meeting last Monday evening on an illustrated folder for presentation to the editors as souvenirs of their visit here, made a report of their progress and submitted a copy of a folder. On motion the matter was referred to the president and secretary and 100 copies were ordered printed.

The matter of Sidney Dell's book on Clatsop county then came up for the chamber's endorsement, as Mr. Dell had compiled with the chamber's request, and had rewritten the first chapter, which he again presented with a letter. The matter was discussed at great length, the members making speeches both for and against. A motion came very near passing that the chamber endorse the book, provided Mr. Dell submit the proof sheets to the president and secretary for their perusal. After more debate a motion passed by one vote that the whole matter of endorsement be laid upon the table.

County Road Plank Sawmill a Success—120 Inches of Rain Discourages Bicyclists.

W. B. Keefe has an English walnut tree on his place loaded with nuts. The Tillamook Water Company stock was sold last week in Portland to Mr. W. H. Cooper and Dr. W. J. May.

J. H. Miller has ordered the Herald to his address at Knappa, Ore. The boys boys all know where to get the news. Postmaster A. W. Sverance has put in a section of keyless boxes for the accommodation of the patrons of the city office.

Clarence Mills, one of the missing soldier boys in the Philippines that was with Lawrence and McCoy, is a nephew of George W. Phelps of this place. The Harrison came in Tuesday evening loaded down to the guards with merchandise for our business men. The Harrison has not been sold as the Lighted Pirate had it last week.

Commissioner Ray brought up a load of cheese from his factory at Hebo Sunday. He has 12 or 13 tons on hand now, and will bring it up as soon as possible for shipment by the next boat.

Messrs. Holman and Richardson, the cattle buyers from Dallas, left for home Saturday with about \$50 head, which they had purchased in this county. P. M. Trout and G. E. Leach went part of the way with them.

There is no truth in the report that the board of county commissioners contemplated purchasing two more portable sawmills, one for the south and the other for the north end of the county to plank roads in both parts.

Claude Thayer has, we learn, leased the Tillamook Lumbering Company's plant and will manufacture lumber for the San Francisco market. William Barker will retain his position as superintendent of the mill and John Edwards will still keep the yards.

Judge Holse opened a special term of the equity department of the circuit court Wednesday, and as we go to press it still in session. The attorneys from a distance in attendance are Wallace Macnaman and W. J. McMahon, of Portland, and M. E. Pogue, of Salem.

The people of the south part of the county, evidently, saw a plank road pretty bad, having made a proposition to Commissioner Ray that they will prepare the road bed, haul and lay the plank if the county will furnish the lumber. Those people deserve good roads, and if we had our way about it we would close the deal with them tomorrow.
