Thursday evening on the Telephone W. J. Ingalls received a shipment of about 1500 and spring buggies, carts, hacks, etc., of the Studebaker brand, and is engaged today setting them up, getting them ready for sale. He expects to do quite a business in light vehicles this summer.

The White House will sell Fourth of July Excursion tickets at the rate of one fare for a trip to all points on the Columbia river between Portland and Astoria July 2, 3, and 4, good returning up to and including the 6th.

On and after date the sale of ten ride commutation tickets between Astoria and Seaside will be discontinued. Parties desiring to use the commutation rate may purchase 20-ride tickets at \$5 each, good for two months from date of sale.

E. C. Blackford, editor of the Clatskanie Chief, was in Astoria yesterday transacting business for his paper. Judging by the advertising columns of the Chief, Astoria merchants are pushing their trade in that section, which, by the way, is one of the richest and most prosperous on the lower Columbia.

Mrs. W. W. Parker returned yesterday from Clatsop, where she had been on a visit with friends and to act as one of the appraisers of the estate of Mrs. Clara Hoshorn, deceased. The other appraisers were John Waterhouse and C. W. Carnahan. They fixed the valuation of the property, which consisted of land, notes and personal property, at \$29,753.

In the circuit court yesterday the following orders were made: U. S. A. vs. John McCann et al., plaintiff allowed until September 1, 1899, to prepare and file their bill of exceptions. Samuel Elmore vs. Duncan Stuart et al., ordered that the receiver's account be approved and he be discharged. Justine Anderson vs. Hugh McCormack et al., motion to dissolve injunction allowed.

The farmers of Grays river are planning to organize a farmers' mutual insurance company. A preliminary organization has been effected, of which H. P. Ahlberg is president, D. R. McIntosh secretary and G. R. Durrah treasurer. A permanent organization is to be perfected when it will be incorporated for the purpose of carrying the fire insurance risks of its members of the company.

J. A. Pastaband, who has the contract of building the big piling raft at Stella for the Robertson Raft Company, had been in Astoria for the past two days taking a rest at his home. Mr. Pastaband states that he is a fine organizer and with the raft will have it completed by about the 15th of August. The work of handling the piling is no small job, for they average 35 feet in length, with many of them running from 100 to 120 feet in length.

Beginning with Saturday of next week the Saturday evening train from Portland will leave that city at 2:30 p. m. instead of 7 p. m., as now, and will be run on through to Seaside, arriving there at 6:30 p. m. There will be no other change in the train service other than that the Sunday evening train for Portland will start with its full complement of cars from Seaside, so as to accommodate the people desiring to return to Portland. The trains will stop as usual at Astoria.

Organizing baseball teams has become a leading diversion in Astoria, as in the other towns of this state. The latest to the Astoria list is a nine organized by the Boat Pullers Club of Upperdown. At a meeting of the club held Thursday evening in the parlors of Engine Company No. 3, the following persons were selected to compose the club's nine: Frank Leinenweber, George Perry, Hiram Leinenweber, Olaf Hansen, Will Painter, Albert Minard, Charles McEwan, Henry Gossney and Chris Leinenweber.

The boys are all municipal young fellows and declare their ability to meet any club that is willing to meet them, though no challenges will be accepted for a couple of weeks yet, as they want to do some practicing before going upon the field.

A. Dunbar, M. S. Copeland and J. E. Higgins, who compose the finance committee for the Fourth of July celebration, were soliciting funds yesterday and last evening reported that \$12 had been subscribed, of which \$13 had been collected. The committee having the matter in charge, announce that they have secured the Astoria Military band for the day and that on Monday, if the weather is favorable, a platform will be erected on the court house square where the exercises will be held. But if the weather is rainy the day will be celebrated in the opera house instead of in Ford & Stokes hall as first announced, as a hall will be given in the hall Fourth of July night, and holding the celebration there would interfere with previous arrangements. The committee earnestly requests that everybody get their flags up on the Fourth.

The ladies aid society of the M. E. church desire to express sincere thanks to the children, the ladies, and the musicians who so generously contributed to the success of the Lilliputian concert, and to acknowledge special obligation to Mrs. J. E. Gratie for instructing the little ladies and gentlemen. In our account of the concert in yesterday's paper the type made us say that a lot of money was raised when Miss Laura Fox, we regret very much that such a mistake appeared and take this means to correct it. We also said that J. W. Belcher favored the audience with a solo. This was not correct. Although he was on the program, he was suffering from a severe cold and was obliged to drop that number. Our reporter could not be present at the entire performance Thursday evening, but he was informed, among other things, by a party present, that the program was carried out just as advertised. Hence the mistake.

The Norwegian steamer Aker came down yesterday bound for Port Arthur with 125,000 feet of lumber, valued at \$2,150. The Aker was dispatched by the Pacific Export Lumber Company and is the first steamer to clear from the Columbia river since Port Arthur. This port is the successor to Vladivostok, and on account of a superior harbor, and less trouble with ice, it will ultimately be the big port of entry of Russia's far eastern possessions. This distinction at one time rested on the port of Nikolai, at the mouth of the Amur river, but the rise of Vladivostok was the doom of the old port with the unpronounceable name. Now, in turn, Vladivostok goes down before Port Arthur. All ports look alike to the Pacific Export Lumber Company, so long as the Russians have the money with which to purchase lumber. While the Aker carried a very large cargo for her register, she was somewhat of a disappointment to the charterers, as they had expected her to carry at least 2,500,000 feet.

INTENT TO KILL.

G. Z. Taylor Narrowly Escapes Being Shot.

His Assailant in Jail and Will Appear in Judge Hughes' Court Today to Answer to Charge of Assault With Dangerous Weapon.

Last night about 8:15 Wm. Martin made an attempt upon the life of G. Z. Taylor, the well known carpenter, in a prominent saloon on Commercial street.

Taylor is dealer in a stud poker game in this saloon, and about 6 o'clock last evening Martin came in and commenced to play. After playing a short time he began to cheat, dealing cards from the bottom of the pack. Taylor objected, and said that if he couldn't play a fair game, he would not play. This angered Martin who called Taylor names and used very abusive language towards him, which naturally aroused Taylor's wrath to such an extent that he slapped Martin with his open hand. Little more was said at the time and Martin soon left the saloon.

About 8. he came in again, stood around a few minutes and again went out going directly to A. G. Spexarth's gun store, where he bought a 12 caliber revolver and immediately went back to the saloon and rushing back to the table where Taylor sat, pointed the gun at his breast and was about to pull the trigger when he seemed to think something was the matter with the gun and held it up and looked at it a moment, then before Taylor had time to rise from his chair, Martin shot, the bullet narrowly missing him and lodging in the wall directly behind him. Taylor jumped up and Martin snatched another cartridge but it failed to go off and as Taylor got to his feet he swung the chair he had been sitting on and threw it at Martin striking his arm and he was in position to shoot again knocking down the muzzle of the gun just as the cartridge exploded, the bullet striking the floor.

Martin then ran out and went back to Spexarth's and found fault with the gun for not firing when it had ought to, he said, "If it had worked properly, I would have killed my man." He then pressed the revolver to Spexarth and was just leaving when Officer Smith came in and placed him under arrest and he was taken to the city jail.

Upon examining the revolver, it was found that two cartridges were empty and another one between the two was snapped but did not go off.

The prisoner is well known around town, he having until recently driven an express wagon for the Grand Transfer Company. He will be brought up in the justice court today on a charge of "Assault with a dangerous weapon."

The only reason that can be assigned for the action is that Martin had been drinking and was just enough under the influence of liquor to be mean. Taylor is to be congratulated on his narrow escape from death.

In the probate court yesterday Judge Gray issued an order for the sale of the personal property of Abraham Jutta, deceased. George Johnson, administrator of the estate, has instructed the court to sell the personal property of the deceased, a fishing boat and net, at private sale.

An arrival down the river yesterday was the British ship Glenessin, which came into port less than a month ago, discharged 362 tons of inward cargo, and is now ready for sea with 300 tons of outward cargo aboard. The Glenessin goes to Alton bay, South Africa, for orders, and has aboard 7,660 bushels of wheat, valued at \$47,500, and 710 barrels of flour, valued at \$19,300. She also carries 60 cases of salmon, valued at \$220, and 92 cases of fruit, valued at \$15.

The coroner's jury in the case of the Chinaman who was strangled in some manner at Clatskanie recently, brought in a verdict of suicide. It was impossible to get any information from the other Chinamen about the dead man, but there is a strong suspicion that he was strangled in his bunk in the bunkhouse, and then hung up to give the Melian man the impression that he had committed suicide. Yum Yai's remains were shipped to Portland and from there they will be shipped to the Flowery Kingdom.

Last evening the naval reserve was inspected by Lieutenant Sherman, and they made a very creditable showing. Their guns, equipment and uniforms were inspected and found to be in first class shape, about 32 members being in line. After the inspection was over, the reserve marched to the Flavel dock and practiced wall scaling, climbing a 10 foot board fence, there with a good deal of agility. Lieutenant Sherman then addressed the reserve saying that when in Portland last week, he had an interview with Adjutant General Tuttle who in answer to his application had consented to place the Columbine at the disposal of the reserve, with which to go down to the bar and greet the returning volunteers upon their arrival at the mouth of the river. The reserve here will have the honor of being the first to meet the returning regiment and will escort them up the river until the Portland fleet of steamers, which will be loaded with patriotic Oregonians anxious to welcome the soldiers home, is reached, when they will return to this city.
