

OPENING FOR BRIGHT BOYS

merits are recorded, the pupil is suspended for a month. Expulsion would then follow any further disobedience.

"What future or possibilities has the poor boy of today?" inquired the reporter.

"I presume, by this question, you would ask what fields in professional or manual pursuits I would designate as the most inviting," was the reply. "Well, in the main, it would of course largely depend on the boy's aptitude and inclination. There are wonderful opportunities in the field of electricity. Some will assert that this branch is overworked, but it is not. The application of electricity in the various commercial and industrial pursuits is phenomenally great. Moreover, it is growing yearly with prodigious strides."

"What schools would you suggest as most advantageous to master such vocation, professor?"

"The Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston is one of the best. The Worcester Polytechnic school, the Sheffield Scientific school at New Haven, and the Lawrence Scientific School at Cambridge are all good."

"But the poor boy hasn't the tuition money."

"If a boy is determined and has the faculty, there is no reason why he should be deterred from getting a scientific education. In short, where there is a will there is a way. Now, let me illustrate. Hartford, it is true, is one of the richest cities in proportion to population, in the world, and the majority of my pupils are children of wealth; but, nevertheless, I have graduated many boys who were absolutely without means. These boys who strive for a professional career found methods to attain it in a number of ways. There were some who engaged to do tutoring for others whose tardiness in their studies necessitated an instructor. In other cases they were found waiting on tables at some of the student clubs. Many of the young men do book canvassing, although it is a measure which, personally, I would hardly commend. I am familiar with a number of instances where the boys have gone into banks and insurance offices and substitute for clerks who were taking summer vacations. There are ways innumerable if the scholar is ambitious."

Professor Smiley again referred to the Hartford high school, which is regarded in New England as one of the best equipped and most popular institutions in all America.

"A department in which we take a great deal of pride," continued the professor, "is our gymnasium. We believe in physical as well as mental development. Our gymnasium is 75x110 feet in size, with 20 feet between floors. We have professional instructors, both for the boys and the girls, and the furniture and apparatus are modern and elaborate. Our running track measures 1/4 mile to the mile. It is a pleasure to watch the sturdy little fellows in their calliope movements, their efforts at graceful carriage, the Spartan contests in sprinting and jumping, their agility with the rings and pulleys and the symmetry of motion with the Indian clubs. Another feature is our manual training school. In this division are taught carpentry or cabinet work, wood turning and carving, iron work, including moulding and forging, the processes of machine shop labor, Venetian iron work, plain and fancy sewing, art needle work, cooking in all its phases, including food values, mechanical drawing and many tributary branches which at the moment escape me. The high school also publishes a paper known as the Chronicle. The editors and manager are chosen from two of our debating clubs, and all articles written for the journal are submitted and passed upon by an executive committee before they appear in print. Prizes are given for the best stories and poem contributions. The paper is an excellent idea, as it fosters an interest in the English course. Many of the brightest conceits in the columns of the Chronicle are from the pens of little fellows 12 and 13 years of age. The debating clubs are conducted on a scholarship basis, and the membership is limited to 3. Those wishing to join make application to the executive committee of the clubs. Of course the clubs being regulated under a scholarship basis, only those who are bright in English literature, composition and debate are able to get in. Each club, male and female, meets every alternate week and occupies the closing hour after school session."

Professor Smiley said that the students of the Hartford high school had for many years ranked with the athletic leaders of the Connecticut Valley association. He describes Hartford as both charming and metropolitan in aspect. The city is about 25 miles above New Haven. All of the high school boys in Hartford go to Yale. There are over 100 of them there now. The graduating class this year numbered 106 and the annual percentage of graduation for 42 as against 33 per cent anywhere else in the country.

Professor Smiley will visit a number of the larger cities on his return trip.

the type of his brother, the German emperor.

"Admiral Von Dietrichs was relieved from his Manila post in accordance with an arrangement of long standing and because his time was up—not as a concession, made in friendliness to the American government. Germany's policy is to prevent other powers from obtaining what she cannot acquire herself."

The admiral continued:

"We need a large and thoroughly equipped navy that can cope with any other power. England is our naturally ally and differences such as those about the Venezuela border and the fisheries do not interfere with the friendly understanding existing between the two nations.

"Our next war will be with Germany."
