The run of salmon was very good yesterday. The cold storage companies had even more than they could handle, and the association launches came up the bay well loaded down. It is fervently hoped that the fish will continue to run for the few days remaining of the season.

J. B. Seiderman, superintendent of state agencies for the Union Central Life Insurance Company, has established headquarters here, and is very favorably impressed with Astoria. He states that he believes Astoria has a very prosperous future, and says that this city is a much better place for headquarters than Portland.

The British steamer Orange Branch arrived in yesterday from Vladivostok and after a short stop proceeded up the river. She will load lumber at St. Helens for Vladivostok. She is of the whaleback type of steamers and carries large loads, her tonnage being 236 tons net. She can carry 600 tons of cargo, or 1,000,000 feet of lumber.

On Saturday night an unknown man the annual picnic of Grace church Sunday school will be held next week, Thursday, August 2, at Olney. Steamer Eclipse and large leaves Fisher's dock at 9:30 a. m. Come and have a good time fishing and swimming, and with the usual games and sports. Adults 25 cents, children 15 cents; the members of the Sunday school free.

Contractor Palmberg commenced work yesterday on a new roof to the Budget building, the former roof having been destroyed by fire a few nights ago. He will put on a flat gravel roof, and expects to finish the last of this week. It is probable that Mr. Palmberg will also put a new roof on Phil Bowers' building, which adjoins the Budget, and which was also damaged by fire.

The baseball game Sunday between the Port Stevens team and the Columbians of this city was one of the best games ever played in Astoria. It was hotly contested from start to finish, but the Astoria boys proved too much for the boys in blue, and at the end of the ninth inning the score stood 10 to 4 in favor of the Columbians. Ponge did

pretty work for the home team, and his playing excited much favorable comment. Ponge was also a winner for the Columbians. Crosby did some fine pitching, and Orlard as catcher was well placed. Mr. Graham of Seattle umpired the game and his location met with much favor from both sides. The game was witnessed by an enthusiastic audience.

Postmaster McDonald held his annual picnic at Grays river Sunday. Fishing and pigeon shooting was indulged in and good success attended the efforts of the sportsmen. Mrs. Bergman entertained the party at the Bergman farm and served them a dinner which they hugely enjoyed. The party returned to Astoria Sunday evening.

Charles E. Dupin, who is connected with the surveyor general's office at Portland, and Walter Keeney, a stockman of Grant county, were passengers on the State this morning for 'Frisco. Mr. Keeney has on board the steamer a two-headed calf, which he is taking to California. The animal has three perfectly formed eyes and two mouths, it eating out of either of them at different times. This freak is very much alive, and, unlike other animals of that kind, seems very healthy.

The case of the state vs. Antonio Sullivan, which had been postponed from Saturday, was brought up yesterday morning in Judge Hughes' court. Witnesses testified that a person known as Valeria Morro did the cutting and then escaped, he not having been seen in Astoria since. Sullivan, however, testifies that Sullivan was evidently of the opinion that Sullivan was the guilty man, as he found him over for trial by the grand jury, fixing his bail at \$100.

Nick Jubich was brought up in the justice court yesterday, charged with striking Chris Peterson with an oar a short time ago while the two were fishing on the river. They were in different boats and it seems that Jubich's brother, who was with him in the boat, shot at Peterson, but failing to hit him, struck him with a gun. The brother, who seems the more serious offender, was still at large yesterday, and the case was accordingly postponed until 2 o'clock this afternoon, at which time it is probable that both the Jubich brothers will be in the toils.

Dr. Jay Tuttle, O. I. Peterson and John Griffin returned yesterday from a horseback trip through the southern portion of the country. They first went to Olney, then took in Medley, Jewell and Minawaka. They went over the Flagnole Ridge, saw some fine Humboldt valley and over to the Nubekum. They were gone a week and report quite a rough trip, at some places on the trails they having to be Indian fashion along their horses, in order to get through the thick brush.

They saw many handsome farms, with grain and hay in good shape, and oats as high as a man's head. Hops were also in a flourishing condition. They had famous luck fishing, and enjoyed their outing, it is needless to say, very much.

REGATTA PROCEEDINGS.

Yesterday's Vote for Queen Shows Miss Isabel Trullinger to Be Again in the Lead.

The regatta committee decided yesterday to offer three prizes for rowing races to be completed for exclusively by the Astoria Rowing club members. There will be two double scull races and one single scull. All members who desire to compete should place their names with Captain John Young.

Chairman Sherman, of the land parade committee, met the general committee and was given full power to make all arrangements for the parade and to select the remainder of his committee. The Astoria Boat Club has two single shells, two double shells, and one lap-streak boat, which correspond to the barges used by the California oarsmen last year, except that the ends of the streak boat are decked over. The probabilities are that the Astoria Boat Club will not only have entries of their own in the double and single scull races, but that the visiting oarsmen will use their shells, which will be a great convenience during the regatta.

Pastures were received yesterday by the committee of Brewer and Wideman, the champion long and short distance swimmers of the world. Wideman's record for 25, 50 and 75 yards was the best ever made. His 100 yard dash was made in 1:06, the American record.

Brewer is no less an expert. His records follow: 25 yards, 1:31, quarter mile, 6:10; half mile, 12:05; one mile, 24:15.

PUSH CLUB MEETS.

And Freely Discusses the Idea of Using the Trading Stamp for Road Purposes.

The meeting of the Push club last evening was largely attended, and was called to order at 8 o'clock with President Hamblet in the chair.

A demonstration was read from Mr. A. B. Hammond saying that it was not possible at the present time to enter on a survey of the proposed railroad extension to Tillamook.

Mr. John Hahn, who was present on invitation, made a strong presentation of the idea of raising money for road improvement by the use of trading stamps

and urging that large sums of money were sent out of the city from the use of the green trading stamps could be secured, kept at home and applied on road improvement. His idea was discussed in a very lively manner by most of the business men present. Herman Wise offering considerable criticism.

Although considerable sentiment favorable to the project was discovered, there also was developed so much opposition that no action was taken by the association, as it has become a practical maxim with this enterprising club to enter on no plans likely to engender divisions in its ranks.

It was generally recommended that the merchants favoring the plan issue stamps on their own account, and many personal assurances were given that those doing so would obtain general patronage.

It is not known what final disposition will be made of the trading stamp idea, but it meets with a good deal of favor in some circles, and it is thought that it would be helpful in raising funds for road improvement. Some merchants contend that it means taking 3 per cent from their profits and say that road funds should be raised from a general tax. The meeting then adjourned, after which a short business meeting of the directors was held.

A KLONDIKE LETTER.

Telling of the Situation in Alaska and the Stampede to Alvin City—Arrival First Mail.

DAWSON, Yukon Terr., June 17.—Editor Astorian: The newly reported mining strike in the Snake river territory about 50 miles north of St. Michael, in the Behr, is beginning to cause quite a little excitement here since the account was published in the outside papers that were received here on the 10th instant, and since then it has become public that several persons here had received letters to the same purpose, so many went down on the steamer that left here the same evening, among whom were F. Green and Mr. Hancherson of Astoria, who were on their way home but would take it in, they said, after hearing the news, then go on afterwards. Mobile expects to go and also Doc Madden on tonight's steamer which has a full passenger list, among whom will be the writer; and as I have thoroughly investigated the information here since the 10th, and I believe that the first steamer up from the mouth of the Yukon would confirm the news as reported in Washington and there would be a great rush from here to the Klondike which are reported shallow ones, only three or four feet deep and running from 5 to 30 miles to the north, which is rich for shallow ground. Therefore I arranged my affairs here and managed to get my claims renewed for 1895 so I could go out and return in the fall or over the ice in March to work next summer my interest on Bonanza creek, and as I had to meet a party here yesterday who came up from Rampart city on the steamer in the morning on business here, to return as soon as possible to Snake river where he stampered to and got action on the winter and left there as late as April 2nd, where he said there were about 150 men. There was reported to him at Alvin City (not Nome, as reported in the papers), at the mouth of the Snake river, the same news as reported outside by letters, and the find was late in the season, after the last steamer went out, they were all busy staking in provisions, building cabins and sluice boxes out of drift logs that had come out of the Yukon and were bunched at the mouth of the Snake river. I concluded it was a slight and decided to go at once to Dry creek, three weeks from Alvin City, also on Alvin creek, and Boulder creek good ground was found. The pay or gold taken out was got in the creek in the gravel, and as there is gold and silver bearing quartz found there also in that part of the country, and from the present outlook and the talk in the city here late last evening there will be my go down on the next steamer, who yesterday were quite skeptical, believing it was the work of the transportation companies, which I have not believed after the first day the news reached Dawson. So I will go on the 20th mile steamer tonight and get ahead of the big rush and get a lot at the mouth of Snake river, also what claims I can get in, then go by steamer to spend the winter if possible. The first through steamer with outside mail, 36 weeks, arrived down from Lake Bennett about 3 p. m. last evening, with quite a few passengers. Two or three of the large steamers that were put on the river to run up to White Horse rapids have already met their doom on the rocks of the Thirty-mile river on account of low water. These steamers were as large as the Telephone and Gatzert on the Columbia. As I view matters here there will be no very ground prospected except the benches along the main creek that are now producing gold which creek that is worked out in a couple of years, and as the affairs are and have been managed, then Dawson will be a back number among mining camps as there are no quartz mines found that will keep up the camp; and I believe that in American territory there will be the future of this country (so called Alaska). There are a few reported Indian American gold of late but as a great deal of it is summer work the next few months will be required to develop much new information. And if the government doesn't make the same mistake as Canada has and is doing—hoarding and taxing the miners out of the country—it will surely be all right. This new find will relieve the surplus here and be a benefit to those that can get down the river and leave the work here for those that remain at living prices. In haste I remain,
