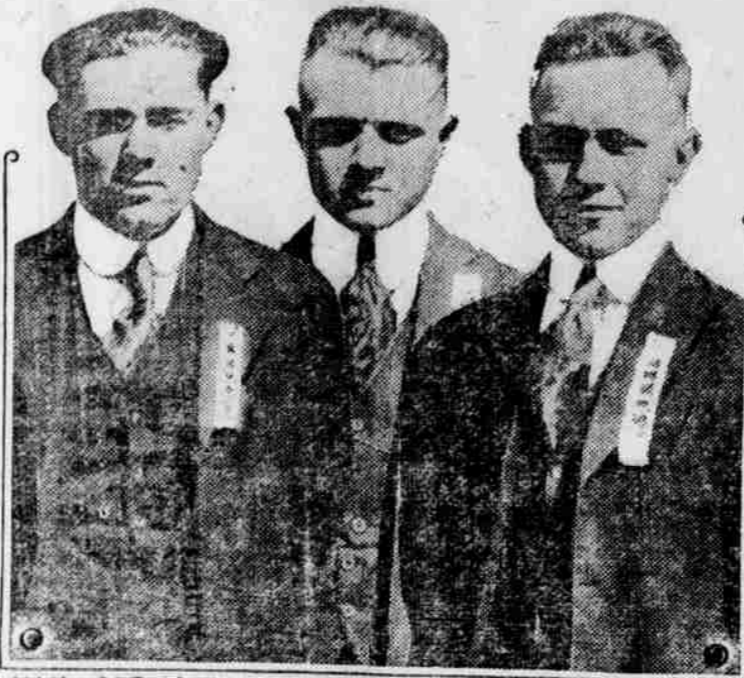

CHAMPION AMERICAN BOY STOCK JUDGING TEAM VISITS EUROPE

Rural Americans Watching Overseas Trip of Future Farmers With Interest.

New York, June 30.—Representing 2,000,000 American farm boys and girls, the Champion live stock judging team of the United States and Canada composed of three Texas farm boys, sailed from New York for a two months' tour of Europe and the British Isles. The youngsters, all under eighteen years of age, last October, defeated twenty States in the International Stock Judging Contest at the Southeastern Fair and Exposition at Atlanta, Ga., winning by 145 points and with a total score of 3,110 points. They are: John Turner of Hillsboro, Texas; Alva Debnam of Lamesa, Texas, and Gilbert Weiting of Marlin, Texas.

Rural America will watch the overseas trip of these boys with interest as they are outstanding specimens of the material from which the ranks of the farmers of the fu-

ture are being recruited. The European trip includes a visit to the Royal British Live Stock Show at London early in July, after which the Guernsey and Jersey Isles will be visited by the team. Later the agricultural and live stock regions of France, Belgium and Holland will be toured for purposes of obtaining first-hand essential information about European farming and stock-raising methods.

Before leaving the United States the boys were presented to President Harding and Secretary of Agriculture Wallace. They will return early in August via Montreal and visit Canadian live stock and farming regions before returning home.

The European trip was offered as a prize to the winning team by the South-Eastern Fair, which defrays all expenses.

WONDERS OF AMERICA

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NATIONAL METHODIST CHURCH

RAMBLING about the so-called "old" section of our national capital one Sunday morning, my attention was attracted to a church which, outwardly, looked but little different than hundreds of other houses of worship which are scattered promiscuously across our broad land and are representative of numerous denominations of religious belief, except for its peculiarly slender and graceful spire.

Approaching this thus distinguished edifice, the air suddenly filled with colorful and pleasing tones, as, from up in the steeple, a chime of ten rare bells called the faithful to devotion.

Entering, I learned that this historic structure was none other than The National Methodist church. After service, I was told and shown how a former bishop and beloved worshippers had immensely enriched it and endeared its memory by unusual con-

tributions collected on their travels in foreign lands.

For instance, some of the marble tiles in the vestibule were brought all the way from the ruins of Solomon's temple in Jerusalem; the keystone in the arch above the pulpit was carved from a stone carried from the ruins of the same far-off temple, and the beautiful pulpit and highly-polished altar rail are partially made from the logs of olive wood, transported from the Garden of Gethsemane and Mount of Olives. An ivy vine which tightly attached itself to the east wall of this old edifice was grown from a slip taken from the tomb of Martin Luther, at Wittenberg, Germany.

Presidents Grant and McKinley, Vice Presidents Colfax and Fairbanks, General John A. Logan and many other men prominent in the affairs of the nation, have worshiped at this shrine.

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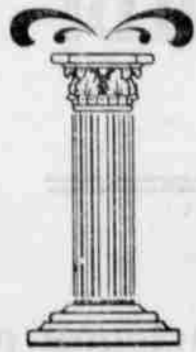

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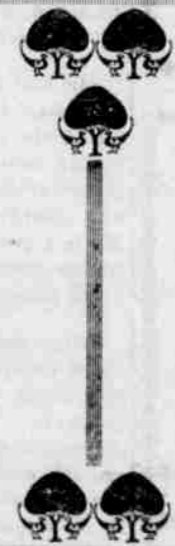
