IRRIGON NEWS NOTES

Mr. McNesby and Elmer Mathews of Patterson, Wash., were in Irrigon, Tuesday on various business matters and informed the correspondent the county commissioners of Benton county had made an inspection trip of the road between Prosser and Patterson and decided to gravel the whole distance, beginning with 12 miles from Patterson and then starting northward out of Prosser until they came to the other gravel work. This is certainly good news for the Irrigon people as some of this road was being cut up since the travel across the Columbia over the ferry line started and needed attention. Notices will also be posted for special election in the Irrigon road district for five mill tax levy and the road to the ferry landing will probably be traveled first.

H. C. Wolfe is endeavoring to help the cabbage lateral this week with a big crew of men and teams and expects to be on the 19 next week. Everybody about Irrigon is busy now that wishes to work.

C. P. Stanyan who moved to Irrigon a week ago, has had the misfortune of losing both of his horses. It is believed they were poisoned from eating corn stalks that had smut or some sort of fungus on them.
Merrill E. Doble has sold his ferry on the river near the ferry landing to Frank Otto of Heppner, Oregon. Consideration being \$1,337.50 for his equity in the property. This will still leave Merrill with 20 acres south of Irrigon. The correspondent has not yet heard just when Mr. Otto expects to build on the place or begin other improvements.

Mr. Castle himself is in charge of a gang of men since the first of the month straightening out the cabbage ditch ahead of the concrete gang for the Reclamation Service.

HOUSE PASSES TAX BILL 274 TO 125

Repeal of Income Surtax Rates Above 32 Per Cent Is Cause of Opposition.

Washington, D. C.—The tax revision bill of 1921, estimated to cut \$818,003,000 from the nation's tax burden by 1923, was passed by the house, 274 to 125, on almost straight party vote.
Three democrats voted for the bill, while nine republicans voted against it. Democrats voting for were Campbell, Pennsylvania, and Duprie and Lazaro, both of Louisiana.
Republicans voting against the bill were Beck, Wisconsin; Claus, Minnesota; Keller, Minnesota; Lambert, Wisconsin; Michaelson, Illinois; John M. Nelson, Wisconsin; Sinclair, North Dakota; Voigt, Wisconsin; Woodruff, Michigan.
Representative London, socialist, of New York, voted against the bill.

Compared with this number of republicans were 50 who voted for a democratic motion to recommend the bill for elimination of the provision repealing the income surtax rates above 32 per cent. This motion was lost, 169 to 230, with one democrat, Campbell of Pennsylvania, voting against it.
The bill now goes to the senate.
As repeal of the excess profits tax and higher income surtaxes would not become effective until January 1, next, the full force of the bill will not be reflected in government receipts until the calendar year 1923, but republican leaders said that the repeal of the transportation and other taxes and reduction in the tax bill in the next calendar year will be approximately \$412,000,000.
