**FARM POINTERS**

Orders for lime should be placed at once with the Secretary of the state line board, Dean A. B. Cordley, Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis. Thirty carloads at \$4 a ton will have to be ordered to justify opening the plant. Should 1000 tons per month be ordered the present price could be materially reduced. O.A.C.

**Out With the Loafers**

Have you removed those hens hatching eggs from the breeding pen from which you do not want to get? Remember that this is the season that even the loafers will lay and eggs from them may hatch more poor producers.

**Spray for Brown Rot**

Where blossom blight, caused by brown rot fungus on cherries, plums, prunes, apricots, and certain varieties of pears, has been bad in past years growers should plan to give thorough spraying with Bordeaux 4-4-50 just as the first petals are opening. Considerable reduction of loss by brown rot has been obtained by using this spray.

**EASTERN OREGON FARM NOTE**

Irrigated barley yielded 1368 lbs. to the acre as compared with 944 lb. of irrigated oats, according to the census figures for Oregon. It will pay to grow more barley than oats unless the region is exceptional frosty or cold. Barley is also far better to plant on land somewhat strong with alkali.

**HEART WOOD BEST FOR POSTS**

Fence posts made of heart wood of mountain cedar will last from 25 to 30 years as compared with 6 or 7 years for those made of sap wood. Heavy posts having a circumference of 21 inches are the most economical to buy. Red juniper posts, split will last much better than the same sized round ones. Nothing but a good post should pay in a permanent fence.

**EARLY PLOWING PROFITABLE**

Summer fallow plowed early of crop yields as high as 9 bushels an acre more than land left till May or June before plowing. Careful observation of good farm practices is the surest and cheapest method of increasing crop yields.

Federation topped all spring wheats under the high irrigated conditions of the Aberdeen experiment station in 1921. Federation yielded 79.7 bushels an acre, which was 19.4 more than Marquis 17.4 more than Bluestem, and 11.7 bushels an acre better than Dicklow.

**GRAIN RATION FOR COWS**

The most economical grain ration to feed dairy cows along with common home grown roughage is composed of corn, 3.90 lbs, mill run 140 pounds and cotton seed meal 100 pounds. Corn is relatively low in price now as compared to barley and oats. Cotton seed meal can be replaced by flax seed meal if succulent or laxative feeds are lacking in the ration.

Look with suspicion on the hen with bright yellow shanks this time of the year. She has probably been loafing on the job until spring came.

**ANOTHER CHAPTER IN JOHN DAY CASE**

In a memorandum opinion written by Judge Gilbert W. Phelps and delivered under date of February 18, 1922, the proceedings of the district, against the district, the directors of the district, and against John H. Lewis, engineer, and certain officials of the district. The purpose of the suit being to enjoin the payment of certain warrants, and the collection of an assessment levied for the purpose of obtaining fund with which to pay the warrants.

In the outset the plaintiffs challenged the legality of the organization, and the constitutionality of the act under which the district was organized. The questions have by prior ruling of Judge Phelps, been decided contrary to plaintiffs' contentions.

The proceedings further attacked two contracts entered into by the board of directors with John H. Lewis, engineer, under the first of which he was to receive a compensation of \$60,000, and under the second he was to receive an additional compensation of some \$44,000.

The court holds the first of these contracts to be valid as to the work done to the point of where it was discovered that the project was not financially feasible, without bringing in additional lands comprising an area of about 110,000 acres and enrolling the additional expense of some \$44,000. As to the work done beyond that point the court holds the contract void and not binding upon the district.

The court further holds that Lewis is entitled to payment for the reasonable value of the work actually done up to the point indicated, this being a matter of settlement between Lewis and the board of directors as now constituted; that if such settlement cannot be had with the board, then Mr. Lewis can report to a court of law to establish and enforce payment of the amount due him for his services.

The second or supplemental contract covering the additional 110,000 acres and calling for payment of the additional \$44,000, the court declares to be ultra vires the board of directors and therefore null and void.

The court then passes to consideration of other expenditures by the board of directors and attacked by the plaintiffs and decides as follows:

1. That the action of the board in voting themselves compensation in excess of \$3 per day was unlawful and warrants for the excess amount should not be paid by the district.
2. That transportation and expenses paid by the directors and their employees in attendance upon conventions and irrigation congresses and not in the actual performance of claims against the district and should not be paid by it.
3. That the expenses of picnics and celebrations are not legitimate charges to be added on the district and that expenses of that nature will be disallowed.
4. That expenses of circulating petitions, attorneys' fees and other charges incurred by the district prior to its organization are not proper obligations of the district and should not be paid out of its funds.
5. That the action of the board of directors in voting \$5,000 out of the funds of the district to defeat this suit and other pending litigation wherein they were defendants was a palpable abuse of discretion, if discretionary, and that their action was void and cannot burden the district.
6. That counsel performing any actual service for the district as such have their claims to be settled with the existing board, or failing in that they have access to a court of law to enforce their just and legitimate demands.

Finally the court holds that, save as to demands that are not legitimate claims against the district as indicated, there is no sufficient ground to enjoin the collection of the district tax.

This memorandum opinion does not constitute the final findings and decree in this cause, but is a summary of what the final decision of the court will be.
