Wheat Not Changed to Cheat.

A great deal of winter oats and wheat and some cheat even was killed out by freezing and thawing. Following this thinning of the planted crops the seed of the so-called buck cheat, which is often present in seed grain and also in the soil on wet lands, came up resulting in heavy stands of cheat. This has misled some persons to believe that grains planted changed to buck cheat. Such change is impossible and the unusually heavy amount of buck cheat in relation amount of grain is due to the fact that the cheat did not kill out as generally as the grains.
Caterpillars Nearly Past

Defoliating caterpillars, so prevalent this year, are in the majority of cases about mature and the injury is about at an end. Observations indicate little likelihood of a repetition of this year's abundant crop of these leaf feeders as parasitic insects are very active on them at present.

AURORA BANK ROBBER ESCAPES WITH \$1155

Aurora, Ore.—After holding up and robbing the Aurora State bank of \$1155, a lone highwayman made his escape. The holdup took place as Miss Vera Cutsforth, assistant cashier, was alone in the bank. The robber compelled her at the point of a gun to surrender all the cash on the counter.

A. L. Graham, a farmer, entered the bank within a few seconds of the man's departure and gave the alarm. A posse immediately organized, but was unable to trace the man after he entered the underbrush near Pudding river.

LIVING COSTS INCREASE

Forty-three Articles Higher and 15 Lower, According to Figures.

Washington, D. C.—An increase of two-tenths of 1 per cent in the retail cost of food to the average family from April 15 to May 15 was announced by the bureau of labor statistics in an analysis of the cost of forty-three food articles marketed by dealers in fifty-one important cities.


The largest increases were noted in the sale prices of cabbage, 8 per cent; eggs strictly fresh, 6 per cent; certain grades of meats, 4 per cent; potatoes, 3 per cent, and bread, rice, coffee and other groceries, 1 per cent. Fifteen articles decreased in price, ranging from onions, with a 29 per cent decrease, to cheese, 4 per cent, milk 2 per cent and butter 1 per cent.
