Union Pacific System Announces Fifteen in 1922 and 1923

Corvallis, Ore.—A free agricultural scholarship, it has just been announced, will be awarded by the Union Pacific System to the highest ranking club boy in fifteen Oregon counties during the years 1922 and 1923. The scholarship will be in the College of Agriculture, or the short winter course of the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon, and will be worth \$75.00, plus transportation.

The counties in which the scholarships will be given are: Baker, Crook, Des Chutes, Gilliam, Harney, Hood River, Jefferson, Morrow, Multnomah, Multnomah, Sherman, Union, Umatilla, Wallowa and Wasco.

For the 1923 requirements it is proposed that ten acres of wheat, five acres of corn, one acre of potatoes, or any of the live stock projects now being conducted under the Boys' and Girls' Club Work, shall be grown or completed by each person entering the above competition. The requirements for 1922 are similar to those of 1923, except that the competition shall be upon projects now in effect, such as calf clubs, pig clubs, potato and corn clubs, etc., and prizes are offered only in such counties as can be arranged before the close of the present season.

The winner in each county will be chosen from among the ten boys ranking highest in the county club projects, on the following basis: 75 per cent on rank in club work; 25 per cent on activities of the boy in community affairs.

The rank of these boys in community affairs, and the county winner, will be determined by a committee of three, consisting of the County Superintendent, one person appointed by the Director of Extension in the Oregon Agricultural College, and a third person to be chosen by these two members.

The scholarship must be used within a year of the date of award, except where the boy is a regular attendant at school. In this case, it may be used the year following, or at the next session following the time the boy finishes school.

The action of the Union Pacific System is due to the fact that its president, Mr. C. R. Gray, formerly a member of the governing board of the Maryland Agricultural College, was attracted by the work of boys' and girls' clubs as a factor in interesting the coming generation in farming; and he believes that the System he heads should further this work by offering scholarships, thereby helping worthy boys to obtain training in scientific agriculture.

Glasgow, president and secretary of the Farm Bureau and motored over to Patterson, Wash., with Mr. Seaman and later in the evening to Boardman district. Enough certified seed potatoes were booked in the afternoon to insure a shipment of a car load into Irrigon this fall for delivery to Boardman, Patterson, Wash., Umatilla and Hermiston. Elmer Mathews at Patterson alone booked up 7,000 pounds of seed. Mr. Seaman at Irrigon and C. D. Albright at Coyote has a blank order book that all who wish this high class seed for the coming season, can enter their orders now and avoid the usual rush and difficulty of securing good seed at the last minute. The varieties will be Early Ohio, Bliss Triumphs, Early White Ohio and Nodded Gem. Earliest of all can also be had with inspection records but not certified as neither the State of Washington or Idaho recognize this variety under the name of Earliest of all. Mr. Albright acted as pilot on the trip from Messner down to the west end.

A special election was held Wednesday to elect one director for one year to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of C. W. Caldwell. Two nominations were made. Elva Lamareaux and Chas. E. Glasgow were both endorsed by the Patriotic societies and the Ku Klux Klan leaders, but failed to create much excitement. C. E. Glasgow was selected by a vote of 28 to 15.

65,423 IN OREGON ARE INCOMPETENT

Portland.—There were in Oregon, at the completion of a survey of the entire state, started in 1920, a total of 65,423 individuals who were or recently had been social liabilities either in communities or in public institutions, demanding the support of the state. This is shown in the preliminary statistical report, just published, of the Oregon state survey of mental defect, delinquency and dependency, conducted by the University of Oregon under the direction of the United States public health service at the request of the state legislature.

Of the 65,423 dependents, 55,549 were cared for in communities, including poor farms, and the remaining 9,874 were in all types of public and private institutions. Within the state there was a total of 30,141 delinquents, which classification has the largest portion of the total.

BOY SCOUTS SAVE TOWN

Forest Fire Headed Off While Approaching Stellacoom, Wash.

Tacoma, Wash.—Tacoma boy scouts at their summer camp on American lake, near here, are credited with saving the town of Stellacoom, Wash., from a forest fire which started near Camp Lewis, and was only a mile from the outskirts of the town when halted by the boys after a detail from camp had fought the fire all night.

Approximately \$15,000 worth of cordwood was saved through the work of the scouts, it was said, and a great deal of green timber in the vicinity was saved by the backfire started by the troop of boys along a two-mile front.

Express Rate Inquiry to Be Made.

Washington, D. C.—Notice was given by the interstate commerce commission Monday that an investigation would be instituted immediately as to the reasonableness of existing express rates in all parts of the country. Hearings will be arranged later, the order said, and a plan of procedure outlined. Though freight rates were reduced July 1, generally 10 per cent from the highest levels reached during the war, express charges have been maintained substantially unchanged since 1920.

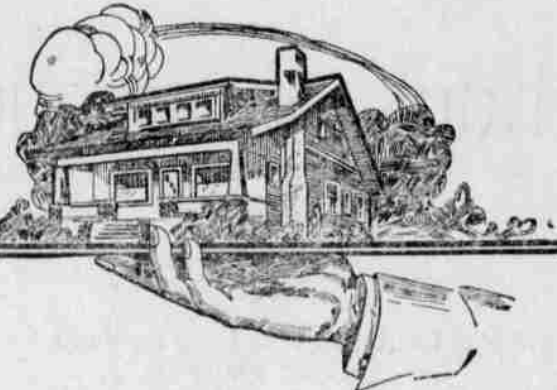
