ATTORNEY REPORTS UMATILLA PROJECT MEETS PROVISIONS

Question having been raised as to whether the Umatilla Rapids irrigation project, being a project of large magnitude lying partly in Oregon and partly in Washington could be developed under the provisions of the McNary-Smith bill without amendment, Sen. McNary presented the matter to Ottamar Hamel, chief counsel of the Reclamation Service, for an opinion.

Mr. Hamel writes that he sees no difficulty in applying the provisions of the McNary-Smith bill to the conditions covering the Umatilla Rapids project. Two irrigation districts would have to be organized, he says, one in each state. Each district would issue bonds and the cost of the entire project apportioned to the lands for repayment. A similar situation exists as to the Lower Yellowstone project in Montana and North Dakota, Mr. Hamel says, and there is no difficulty in it.

George Fleming Moore, past grand commander of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite was elected president of this National organization. William J. Mahoney, D. D. L. D. Imperial Klodard of the K. K. K. elected as its first vice-president and many others of equal prominence among its other officers, assuring the new organization undoubted success. Several here are already clamoring to get into its fold. The object of the Council will be along the following lines: To maintain and defend the constitution of the United States and the several states the rights and liberties and free institutions secured thereby, and to seek co-operation of all patriotic societies. The Council will oppose by all lawful means taxation or appropriations for any sectarian or demonstrational institutions. It demands equal rights for all but special privileges to none. It will publish literature along these lines and eventually ask for laws that no man be made a citizen of these U. S. who is obligated to any king or potentate. Any man who can prove himself free of all such obligations taking preference to the laws of this great country, may become a member regard less of the ground of his birth and need not wear the so-called hood. Millions in membership is already assured within a few months.
