SHORT PHEASANT SEASON DISAPPOINTS HUNTERS

Many of the local sportsmen were anticipating several weeks of China pheasant hunting when they read the decision of the State Game Warden for the season on upland birds. But their joys were soon quelled when upon investigation it was found that by the term "upland birds" was meant "native pheasant and grouse". So to get even, some are planning on going deer hunting.

The following is the decision as it appeared in the Portland papers on Thursday, August 17:

"Hundreds of hunters are making preparations for the opening of the deer season on Sunday, according to Captain A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden. Under a recent decision of the state game commission the season on upland birds will open at the same time and will run concurrently with the deer season.

"This action was taken to allow hunters some game meat, should they fail to bag a deer during the first few days of camp. As usual, the deer season will last until October 31. The bag limit is two bucks for each hunter.

"Oregon now has a more generous deer season than any other state in the union, according to Captain Burghdoff. Pennsylvania, which is rapidly developing into a great deer hunting state, has only a ten day season, while Colorado has a four day season, with a limit of one buck. Approximately 20,000 deer were killed in Oregon during the season last year, but through stringent enforcement of the laws protecting does, there are nearly as many deer this year as ever. A good hunting season is predicted by the state game warden, who have been active in the mountains this summer."

\$6,362,311 SPENT IN OREGON BONUS

Salem, Or.—A total of \$6,362,311.01 has been disbursed out of the state bonus fund, according to a statement prepared by Secretary of State Koser Saturday. Of this amount \$4,057,305.84 went to cover applications of 18,239 ex-service men for cash bonus payments, and \$3,305,005.17 went to cover 924 applications for bonus loans.

Every county in the state is represented in the distribution of bonus funds and loans have been made in all counties of the state with the exception of Curry, Grant and Jefferson. Almost one-third of the entire amount so far disbursed from the bonus fund has gone to Multnomah county, according to a table prepared by Koser, which shows that in most of the counties the cash bonus far exceeds the bonus loans. The exceptions to this are found in Deschutes, Gilliam, Klamath, Polk, Union, Wallowa and Wheeler counties in which the bonus loans have proved the most popular.

COAL INQUIRY MEASURE UP

Commission Contemplated to Study All Phases of Industry.

Washington, D. C.—A bill to carry into effect President Harding's recommendations for a sweeping government investigation of the coal industry was introduced by Chairman Winslow, of the house commerce committee after a visit to the White House.

The measure called for appointment by the president of a commission of not to exceed nine members with instructions to report to the chief executive and congress by July 1, 1923. The commission would have wide powers of investigation, including the right to examine the books of various coal producing companies.

Price Increase Noted in July.

Washington, D. C.—Wholesale and retail costs of food and other commodities took an upward jump in July, retail prices averaging a 1.5 per cent increase while wholesale prices gained about 3 1/2 per cent, as compared with June, the department of labor announced.
