### CHANGE DATE OF WORLD'S FAIR AT PORTLAND TO 1927

The change of the date of the Ore-  
gon exposition from 1925 to 1927  
which has been under consideration  
for several months by the exposition  
committee came to a final issue Fri-  
day and the date was changed. Here-  
after it will be known as the Oregon  
1927 exposition. Except for the  
change in date the fair plans will go  
ahead as they have up to this time.

The fear has been growing in Port-  
land that the exposition could not  
be built within the time limit and  
also that difficulty might be experi-  
enced in raising the stock subscrip-  
tion of \$1,000,000 within the time  
limit of December 20, 1922. For  
these reasons it was deemed advisable  
to postpone the big show.

This will not change the measure  
to be voted upon by the people of  
the state authorizing Portland to set  
aside the six per cent tax limitation  
law in Portland long enough to tax  
itself for the exposition. There is  
no change whatever in the state mea-  
sure. In Portland the ballot measure  
has been changed so that an addi-  
tional year is given in which to raise  
the stock subscription of \$1,000,000  
and two years additional time is pro-

### AMERICAN LEGION NATIONAL CONVENTION AT NEW ORLEANS

Thousands of ex-service men are  
expected to attend the American Leg-  
ion National Convention at New  
Orleans, October 16-20th as a result  
of the announcement of a railroad  
rate of one fare for the round trip.  
The reduced fare, which will be ef-  
fective on all roads, will apply to  
members of the American Legion,  
and its auxiliary, widows of deceased  
members of the Legion and to dele-  
gates to the convention of the Inter-  
allied Veterans' Federation which will  
be held the week before the Legion  
gathering. Legion convention offi-  
cials estimate that a crowd of 100-  
000 visitors will attend the national  
gathering as a result of the fare re-  
duction. Several thousand legion-  
naires are also expected to take advan-  
tage of the fifty per cent reduction  
granted on all vessels of the United  
States Shipping board.

The railroad rate table based on  
the reduced rate shows that those  
in Oregon contemplating attending  
the convention, will pay \$98.53 for  
fare from Portland, Oregon to New  
Orleans, La., and return.

### Motion Picture May Be Shown in Court as 'Exhibit A' in Life Insurance Law Suit



LOS ANGELES courts will de-  
cide if the insurance protec-  
tion carried by Roy Stewart  
is to be suspended while he is en-  
gaged in a particularly hazardous  
picture. Attorneys for the five com-  
panies underwriting the star's risk  
allege that his work in "The Radio  
King," is a violation of his policy.  
It is pointed out that he is con-  
stantly working with high voltage  
electricity and incurring risk to life  
and limb. While not denying that

his work is unusually hazardous in  
"The Radio King," attorneys for  
Stewart and for the Universal Film  
Manufacturing Company argue that  
he is entitled to protection under  
his policy regardless of the hazard.  
It is set forth in the brief that  
"The Radio King" is a chapter play  
based upon science and particularly  
the radio and that electrical experi-  
ments of a dangerous nature are  
conducted. In proof of this a por-  
tion of the film will be shown in  
the courtroom if necessary.

### Drama League Honors Charles Kenyon, Film and Script Authority

Signal honor for Charles Kenyon,  
one of the supervisors of the scenar-  
io department at Universal City,  
and proof that he will rank perman-  
ently as one of the greatest dramatic  
writers of America, is contained in  
a letter sent him from Marjorie A.  
Best, chairman of the Drama League  
of America.  
The letter is an announcement  
that "Kindling," the chief play in  
Kenyon's list of brilliant dramatic

works, has been chosen by the  
Drama League as one of five repre-  
senting the best American plays of  
all times. The judgment was made  
at the request of M. Gemier, di-  
rector-general of the Paris Odeon,  
who will stage the plays most typi-  
cal of the highest products of the  
American theatre.  
Kenyon's efforts as a screen writer  
have met with the same striking  
success that in the field of the drama  
gave him the highest rank as a  
playwright. Because of such work  
as "Kindling," he is recognized as  
an international authority on the  
drama, and Universal executives be-  
lieve that his influence on the screen  
will bear this same distinction.

### Universal to Make Screen Versions of Four "Best Sellers"

Four stories of dramatic quality  
have been purchased by Universal  
in the past few days.

"Laramie Lad" is a short story by  
Ralph Cummins which appeared in  
a popular magazine. It presents all  
the essentials of a good vehicle for  
"Hoot" Gibson. A. P. Younger is  
preparing the scenario. The picture  
will be released under the title "The  
Lone Hand."

George Randolph Chester, the fa-  
mous novelist who is acting as a  
scenario supervisor at Universal  
City, will prepare the continuity of  
a story which has been purchased  
for Gladys Walton's use. It is "The  
Lavender Bath Lady," an original  
yarn by Shannon File.

Chester previously prepared two  
of Miss Walton's vehicles "Top O'  
The Morning," Anne Caldwell's  
play, and "The Girl Who Ran  
Wild," an adaptation of Bret Harte's  
classic, "M.L.s." George Hull col-  
laborated with Chester in the latter.

Another story for Miss Walton's  
use which has not been bought is  
"Saw Just," a Red Book magazine  
short story by that brilliant writer,  
Courtney Riley Cooper. Doris  
Schneider is writing the scenario.  
"One Wonderful Night" has been  
purchased and is being prepared for  
Herbert Rawlinson's use by Arthur  
Stauter.

### Austrian Army Officer Laundry Wagon Driver

Albert De Conti Cadassan was

the Austrian army. He qualified  
and is now doing research work for  
Erich von Stroheim at Universal
