### CORN NOW MAIN FOOD OF NATION

Washington, D. C.—Corn has supplanted wheat as the principal food supply of the United States, according to a comprehensive review just completed by the department of agriculture.

The vital importance of the corn crop and its relation to American prosperity has been made the subject of an intensive study by the department's experts, and the findings put in the 1921 yearbook, just published, which in a graphic survey presents the story of corn in all its details.

Corn is produced by nearly 5,000,000 of the approximately 6,500,000 farms in the United States. Nearly 100,000,000 acres of farm land is devoted to the production of this single crop, which, in recent years, has reached more than 3,000,000,000 bushels. The value of the crop during the war reached more than \$3,000,000,000 or one-eighth of the present national debt. The 1920 crop, the largest ever produced, had a value of \$2,150,000,000; the 1921 crop, \$1,393,000,000.

Forty per cent of the total American corn crop is fed to swine on farms. 20 per cent is fed to horses and mules on farms. Only 10 per cent is used directly for human food, but 85 per cent is used through the consumption of meat and meat products.

### BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

General Pershing left Washington Sunday on a speaking trip through the middle west to advocate national preparedness.

Premier Bonar Law introduced in the British house of commons the bill putting into effect the constitution of the Irish free state.

The board of directors of the United States chamber of commerce has decided to submit the question of increased federal aid for education to a referendum of the membership.

Announcement has been made that the "Hill group" of railroads will spend \$1,000,000 in a four-year campaign advertising Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

About 1000 nominations, mostly of postmasters, but not including supreme court or other federal judicial selections, were sent to the senate by President Harding when congress convened.

The national grange in the final session of its ten day convention at Wichita, Kan., went on record as opposing a ship subsidy by the United States government by the unanimous adoption of a resolution against the measure.

The bill to provide for purchase and sale of farm products through a \$100,000,000 government corporation, introduced in the senate by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, was presented in the house by Representative Sinclair, republican, North Dakota.

**Asks More Specific Case on Daugherty**  
Washington, D. C.—Congressman Oscar E. Keller, republican of Minnesota, must be more specific in his impeachment charges against Attorney General Daugherty, the house judiciary committee decided in a resolution unanimously adopted.

**Ritner Will Act For Olcott.**  
Salem, Or.—Roy Ritner of Pendleton, president of the state senate, will act as governor during the absence of Governor Olcott, who has gone to West Virginia to attend a meeting of governors. Governor Olcott expected to be away from the state for a month.

**Portland Union Station Damaged.**  
Portland, Or.—The union station, Sixth and Johnson streets, was damaged to the extent of about \$50,000 early Sunday morning by fire.

## POLICY OF U. S. JOLT TO ALLIES

### Statement of Opposition to All Secret Treaties By America Causes Stir.

Lausanne.—America gave Great Britain, France and Italy a hard jolt when her spokesman, Richard Washburn Child, declared that the United States government has the support of the American people in its opposition to all secret treaties and agreements, particularly those designed to create zones of economic and commercial influence such as the San Remo tripartite agreement of 1920, which apportioned the Mesopotamian oil fields among the three big powers.

Mr. Child's exposition was merely a restatement of Secretary of State Hughes' aide-memoire of October 30, in which he defined for the benefit of the British, French and Italian governments the functions of the American observers to the Lausanne conference and broadly outlined America's open door policy for the near east—but it was a restatement under conditions that made it sensational.

It came as the conference was about to begin consideration of Turkey's Asiatic boundaries and it was a clear warning that America will not remain silent if the three inviting powers insist upon preferential rights in oil, mineral, railway and power development in present Turkish territory or in that which was lopped off by the war.

It was not possible for the delegates of the inviting powers to conceal their impatience at America's insistent reiteration of her policy which they resent especially because of her refusal to accept a vote in the conference, to sign any report or to accept any responsibility further than to act as an adviser.

The American new attitude, however, is according great satisfaction to the neutral countries represented here.

## EARTHQUAKE SHAKES MIDDLE WEST TOWNS

St. Louis, Mo.—Earth tremors strong enough to break windows, shake buildings and homes and rattle dishes were felt in St. Louis, southern Illinois, eastern Indiana and western Kentucky Sunday night, according to reports received here.

At St. Louis university seismographical observatory, where the tremors were recorded, attendants described them of moderate intensity. They said seismographic indications pointed to the tremors occurring in a southerly direction. A shock which experts said was "sudden" and of sufficient intensity to cause slight damage in homes was recorded. No actual damage other than the breaking of windows was reported up to a late hour.

A dispatch from Eldorado, Ill., said chimneys on several residences were toppled to the ground by the tremors although no serious damage was reported there.

### CLEMENCEAU IS CRITICISED

**Hitchcock Leads Off in Debate by Attack on the Frenchman.**

Washington, D. C.—The Tiger of France again came under fire in the senate Monday, when his utterances on his tour of the United States were the subject of a conflicting debate.

Senator Hitchcock, democrat, Nebraska, ex-chairman of the foreign relations committee, led off in the debate with an attack on M. Clemenceau and on French policies, and was joined in the criticism by other senators, while Senator Myers, democrat, Montana, came to the defense of the aged French statesman. Senator Owen, democrat, Oklahoma, also expressed sympathy with M. Clemenceau's mission to America, but criticised French policies.

**New Army Command Created.**  
Washington, D. C.—A new and separate command, known as the American forces in China, was announced in army orders. Brigadier-General W. D. Connor, former assistant chief of staff, will establish headquarters in Peking at an early date and, it is understood, will act as commanding officer of the American forces in China.

**St. Paul Man For Supreme Court.**  
Washington, D. C.—Pierce Butler of St. Paul, Minn., a democrat, was nominated by President Harding as associate justice of the supreme court to take the place made vacant by the resignation of Associate Justice Day.

**Irish Rebel Leader Executed.**  
Dublin.—Erskine Childers, chief lieutenant of Eamonn de Valera, was executed for having had an automatic pistol in his possession.
