SIXTH OF LIVESTOCK

IN UNITED STATES

The United States, with only one sixteenth of the world's population has one-sixth of the world's live stock, says the United States department of agriculture. It has one-half of the world's 3,000,000 mules, onethird of the 169,000,000 swine, one fifth of the 100,000,000 horses, oneseventh of the 492,000,000 eattle. and one-ninth of the 465,000,000 sheep. As consumers of meat per capita, we stand fourth in the list. with an average of 142 pounds per person per year. We are exceeded by Argentina with an annual consumption per person of 281 pounds Australia with 262 poumb, and New Zealand with 213 pounds, Canada follows us closely with 137 pounds and the United Kingdom with 120. The figures for the United States are the average of the 10 years from 1912 to 1921, while the pre-war-figures.

FEED REQUIRED TO FATTEN CARLOAD OF LIVESTOCK

How much feed does it take to fatten a carload of cattle, hogs, or sheep? Here are some figures based on investigations by the United States department of agriculture:

Six bundred bushels of corp and 17 tons of hay will fatten 250 lambs weighing 55 pounds each and make them weigh 80 pounds. This will make one double-deck carload.

Four hundred fifty bushels of corn and 2,750 pounds of tankage or fish meal will fatten 70 hogs averaging * 100 pounds, to 200 pounds, making one carload.

One thousand one hundred bushels of corn, 10 tons of alfalfa hay, and five tons of straw will fatten 20 steers averaging 850 pounds making them gain 325 pounds each in 180 days. This is an average carload.
