FARM TOPICS

YOUNG PIGS THEM DIE FROM ATTACK OF BURNERS

Thousands of last year's plantings that might have been saved were wiped out. Thousands of young fruit trees, planted last spring, were killed during the summer by attacks of borers, says A. L. Lovett, chief in entomology at Oregon experiment station. This large loss was sustained in spite of the fact that borers may successfully attack any unthriftily growing trees. The excessive drought conditions of last summer caused a severe drain on the vitality of the trees, particularly those young trees which had insufficient time to develop a good root system.

Two methods of preventing borer tree attacks are suggested by Mr. Lovett. The placing of a barrel stave, or similar shield on the southwest side of the tree to cast a shadow on the trunk

is one method. This prevents sun scald of the bark which attracts borer attacks.

A good whitewash is also a protection against attacks of boring insects. One of the most successful recipes for making whitewash is eight pounds of quick lime, one-half pound of glue or casein (powdered), one-fourth pound of copper sulphate, and one pound of flaked kieselguhr, with enough water to make a whitewash about the consistency of paint. Carbolic acid at the rate of one-half pint to eight gallons of whitewash may be substituted for the kieselguhr.

BIRDY-AUX-BEST MOSS CONTROL

Moss and lichens on fruit trees may be quickly destroyed during the winter by spraying with ordinary lye at the rate of one pound to six or eight gallons of water. If San Jose or other scale is present add the lye dissolved in a little water to the usual winter strength lime-sulphur. Thorough spraying of this solution will remove both the moss and scale, lye removes moss most rapidly but not permanently. For permanent prevention the O. A. G. experiment station recommends the usual Bordeaux spray.

Applied for apple tree anthracnose, peach leaf curl, and prune and cherry blossom-blight it will prevent the moss from developing.

SWINE RAISING PROFITABLE

Swine raising is generally profitable, according to 1921 and 1922 reports of the United States department of agriculture, says H. A. Livingston, Oregon agricultural extension specialist. These reports, from the corn belt region, show that in 1922 there was an increase of 27 per cent in the number of litters of fall pigs farrowed in that region as compared with a like report for 1921, showing an increase of 18 per cent.

The old rule still applies—that when the cost of 515 pounds of corn is as low as the market price for 100 pounds of pork, live weight, there is a tendency toward an increased production of hogs, but when the cost of 615 pounds of corn is more than the market price for 100 pounds of pork the production decreases.
