LEARN A LESSON FROM IDAHO FARMERS

If your garage burns and the mortgage on the house is foreclosed and your wife has twins, do you sit down, wring your hands and wail or do you look the situation straight in the eye, grapple it with both hands and start building anew? If you're a wailer, look at the irrigation farmers of southern Idaho, take heart and follow their example.

During the war years of high prices the Snake River, sole source of the irrigators' water supply, was so low that the crops were short. When water became abundant, prices dropped disastrously. Alfalfa and beets were the principal output of the district; they did not drop—they leaped and tumbled down the price precipice.

Yet the producers did not wail. On the contrary, they got ready for increased production. In January they organized by an almost unanimous vote the largest irrigation district in the world for the sole purpose of helping to build the huge American Falls dam and reservoir for the storage eventually of 3,000,000 acre feet of Snake River flood water, to the end that the threat of a water famine might be definitely ended and the productive area increased by a million acres.

If you are a wailer, stay away from Idaho. They have use only for builders who wail no breath in the commission of doleful sounds.—March Sunset.

## FARM TOPICS

(O. A. C. Experiment Station.)

Increased profits amounting from 30 to 50 per cent can be realized by the fruit grower by better control of pests and diseases through better spraying. To get the most effective result from each spray, better timing of the sprays is necessary as well as a more skillful and thorough application.

Medium sized broccoli plants receive less injury by cold than those which have made a long rangy succulent growth. Too early transplanting on rich soils causes the plants to become susceptible to low temperatures while the smaller plants are checked in growth and become more hardy. It is better to transplant the plants on July 12 to 15 than June 20 to 25.

Tomato mosaic, uncontrolled, may cause the complete loss of the crop, depending on the temperature and season of the year. If this disease appears, immediately remove all diseased plants and fumigate the green house with nicotine or dust all the plants thoroughly with nicotine dust to get rid of all aphids which may carry the disease from plant to plant.

Oat variety trials at the O. A. C. experiment station have shown Three Grain, Victory, and Shadeland Climax, or Swedish Select to be excellent varieties. Successful oat growing depends upon reasonably rich soil, early sowing and treated seed. The best treatment for oats is usually the spritlike method with formaldehyde solution. They should be treated just the day before planting. There are but a very few certified Shadeland Climax available at the present time.

### CONSUMPTION OF MILK IN UNITED STATES INCREASING

As a nation we are becoming greater consumers of milk every day. In the last decade, as determined from figures supplied by health officers of 356 cities having a total population of 32,000,000, the daily per capita consumption has increased from .5 of a pint for every man, woman, and child, to .7 of a pint. This is an increase of nearly 17 per cent.

These figures are thought to give a good indication of the trend of milk consumption among all of the people of the country. There are, however, variations in different sections that may be attributed to various factors, including climate and the kind of population. The per capita consumption is shown to be lowest in the southeastern states where the climate makes the preservation of milk more of a problem than in the north, and where there is a large proportion of negroes who are small users of milk.

The per capita consumption of milk in cities varies a great deal. The large cities have a higher rate of consumption per capita than the smaller ones, with the exception of those having less than 5000. The people in these villages and small towns are the biggest users of milk in the country.

### U. S. SOIL SURVEYS SERVE GREAT VARIETY OF USES

Soil surveys made by the bureau of soils, United States department of agriculture, are filling an increasing variety of demands. Prominent among these demands, in addition to those coming from the cooperating states, are those from development companies interested in opening up large tracts of cut-over land to settlement, from the home-seeker or farmer looking for a new location, from road engineers, land banks, and large loan companies.

Cooperating with the department of justice, representatives of the soil survey furnished expert testimony in a case involving the changing of state boundaries during the past year. A detailed map was made of the soils of the Red River bottoms in the vicinity of the Burk Burnett oil field, for the purpose of showing the process by which the bottoms were built up, this fact having an important bearing on the settlement of a boundary dispute between Texas and Oklahoma. The question as to whether the land in controversy was formed by accretion or by avulsion would practically decide the issue, and consequently extremely detailed soil maps, profile maps of deep borings, and careful mechanical analyses of material were necessary in order to determine the presence or absence of a gradation from coarse to finer alluvial sediments from the edge of the bottoms toward the uplands.

ENROLLMENT PASSES 9,000  
Records of the bureau of animal husbandry show, early in 1923, a total of 9,116 livestock owners enrolled in the "Better Sires—Better Stock" campaign conducted by various states and the United States department of agriculture to improve the quality of domestic animals. Each of these persons has filed with the department a written agreement to use pure-bred sires of good quality of all classes of livestock kept. The number of breeding animals owned by the persons enrolled now covered 1,100,000 head, and marked improvement in the stock is reported from time to time. Department records show clearly that the use of pure-bred sires stimulates also the use of pure-bred female livestock and brings about gradual improvement with each generation.
