EMPHATIC BRITISH NOTE HANDED SOVIET

Break in Relations Between Two Countries Thought to Be Near.

Moscow. - An emphatic note from the British government handed to Maxim Litvinoff, assistant foreign minister alleging propaganda and other violation of the Anglo-Russian trade agreement and demanding assurances of unconditional fulfilment of specified requirements within 10 days, was considered by Russian officials as definitely intended to bring about a break in Anglo-Russian relations.

The note, which is very lengthy, was handed to the soviet government by Mr. Hodgson. One of its most striking passages read: "It is time the soviet government should be made aware that it cannot with impunity behave toward British subjects and British shipping in this arbitrary and intolerable manner."

The Common Council of the city of Boardman, Morrow County, State of Oregon, is hereby authorized and empowered to borrow on the faith of said city the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars, or such lesser sum as shall assure compliance with the statutory limiation of the indebtedness of said rify, which limitation is \$2,500.00. from such person or persons, firm or corporation as said Common Counil may deem best, and said Common Council is hereby authorized to cause the warrants of the city to be issued by the proper officers thereof as ollows: Three Hundred Dollars pay able in one year from the date of such issue, Four Hundred Dollars payable in two years from date of such issue, Five Hundred Dollars payable in three years from the date of such issue, Six Hundred Dollars payable in four years from the date of such issue and not to exceed Seven Hundred Dollars payable in five years from the date of such issue; all thereof to bear interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum, payable semi-annually; the money so to be borrowed to be used for the purpose in this ordinary dealers. in this ordinance declared, and not otherwise.
