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**FARMERS TURN BACKS ON
OLD TYPE OF FARMING**

There are farms in this county that will never get out of debt. It is not in the cards with ordinary farming. Under present conditions each year will see the debt grow bigger. Here is a way out. Other districts have done it when they turned their backs on the old style of farming and went into the dairy business. This does not mean that every man who goes into the dairy business will make a success of it, for there are men who will not make a success of anything, but the dairy business does offer a fine opportunity for those who will exert their brain and settle down to steady work. Some of the richest farming districts in the United States are the dairy districts. At Hermiston City is a creamery. This creamery will buy all the butterfat offered. Here is your opportunity. If you want it take it, and if you don't, leave it alone and watch the mortgage on the ranch grow. At one time this creamery distributed as high as \$14,000 a month among the farmers.

Sherran Davis has taken charge of the operative part of the Prairie Cooperative creamery. A campaign will be made to encourage Grant county farmers to milk more cows and eat the products of their industry. Farmers should eat what they produce if they expect others to do the same, and to promote an industry that operates for their benefit they should call for home made butter when they go to the store.—Cannon City Eagle.

The dairy cows of Oregon have taken seriously the agitation for better production per animal, and have increased their individual production 17 per cent in the past ten years.

At the meeting Saturday, refreshments were served and we had the opportunity to test two cakes, the receipts for which Miss Smith gave us.

One is a molasses sponge cake, which was pronounced most delicious, and the other was a plain sponge cake. The receipts are printed below: Each, you will find, very delicious. The committee take this opportunity to thank all who helped in sewing at this meeting and also all those who helped to make other meetings so successful.

Receipt for molasses sponge cake, with directions for making:
One-fourth cup fat, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-4 cup molasses, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1-2 cup hot water, 1 egg.

Melt fat in a saucepan; add molasses and sugar; add flour mixed and sifted with spices, salt and soda; add hot water; add unbeaten egg; beat altogether with egg beater and bake twenty to thirty minutes in a shallow tin in a moderate oven.

Plain sponge cake with directions:
One cup sugar; 1 tablespoon lemon juice, grate rind of one-half lemon (only yellow outside of rind); whites of six eggs; 1 cup flour; 1-4 teaspoonful salt. Beat yolks thick and lemon colored, using Dover egg beater.

Add sugar gradually and continue beating; add lemon juice and grate rind.

Add whites of eggs beaten until stiff and flour mixed and sifted with salt. Cut out and fold mixture carefully together. Bake one hour in slow oven, in angel cake tin or deep narrow pan.
