IRRIGON NEWS ITEMS

The writer was too busy last week to give out the news.

J. W. Warner, Mrs. Warner and the boys made a trip to The Dalles last week, returning Sunday.

Mr. Benefiel of Forest Grove, Ore., was an Irrigon visitor last week. He was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Benefiel and Ernest and Mrs. E. W. Benefiel.

Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Smith of Hillsboro and Mrs. A. P. W. Leverage of Starbuck, Wash., were guests of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Glasgow several days this week. Mrs. Leverage is a sister of Mr. Glasgow.

A. S. Swarts, wife and family accompanied by Mrs. Lena Gibson of Granger, Wash., made a surprise on Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Williams Saturday and spent the day on the river, returning to Granger late Sunday evening. They had a big feed of Irrigon melons and declared they were equal to anything grown anywhere.

The watermelons, big yellow muskmelons, the New Irrigons and the Prides of Irrigon are now moving in quantities. The Association is shipping east and west by express and truck loads going out every day. They have also built several temporary sheds at the Service station on the highway. One of these is being used for packing house and storage shed, one for an eating place for tourists, and the other for retail business facing the highway. A large ice box was made to order and watermelons will be served whole and sliced right off the ice. Several tons of melons will move through this medium daily from now on.

Egg production has been increased 40 per cent in the past four years in Williams County, Ohio, through the adoption of methods of care and feeding of poultry advocated by agricultural extension workers, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture. This county had been producing previously an annual average of 1,500,000 dozen eggs.

Each year thirsty Americans consume 4,000,000,000 bottles of soft drinks, and this total does not include beverages such as near beer made from cereals, says the department. These drinks come from 10,000 bottling establishments and over 110,000 soda counters. The skilled chemist has provided a host of flavors which the consumer can not distinguish from the original. The aroma as well as the color and flavor of fruits is being imitated. These modern beverages contain nothing dangerous to health, but the food and drugs act demands that such products be labeled for what they are.

Farmers in some 1,200 counties kept accounts of the expense, labor, and profit connected with their farming enterprises in 1922 according to a report of department. By means of these accounts farmers made analyses of their business with the assistance of their county agricultural extension agents, to determine how to increase their net incomes over a period of years.

PRACTICALLY NO HAY SOLD YET THIS YEAR

John Gossage has shipped the only hay thus far this season. There is no market yet, but indications point to a big demand later as alfalfa is going to be scarce on account of the decreased acreage in Oregon, the weevil in Idaho and the partial failure of forage in Western Oregon.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT REPORTS CASH SALES

The Treasury Department has just announced that the net cash sales of United States Treasury Savings Certificates, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, aggregated \$195,019,734, of which amount this Federal Reserve District sold \$16,396,327.

"These very substantial figures meet our expectations," said John U. Calkins, Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, who is Chairman of the Government Savings Organization for this District. "If sales are maintained at this rate year after year it would mean carrying approximately one billion dollars of the public debt in the form of Treasury Savings Certificates which, in the opinion of Treasury officials, would be a real contribution to Government financing."

"Treasury Savings Certificates have attracted large numbers of small investors by reason of their absolute safety with profitable return," said Governor Calkins. "These little securities will continue to be offered to the public with a view of helping banks and other legitimate financial institutions to safeguard the funds with investments and therefore become victims of unscrupulous stock promoters and other highly speculative propositions." The Certificates can be obtained at all money order Post Offices, from Federal Reserve Banks or their branches, and through most other banks and reputable bond houses.

"How Other People Get Ahead" is the title of a booklet recently issued by the Savings Division of the Treasury Department to aid in this effort. It gives the essentials of good investment and tells how to avoid dangerous financial ventures. This booklet can be obtained free by application to the Government Savings Organization in the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. It will be promptly sent upon request.
