Editor Mark A. Cleveland, of the Boardman Mirror, paid a brief visit to the school building last Tuesday.

John J. Carroll, who taught manual training a part of last year, writes from Fallon, Nev., as follows:

"Well, here I am way down in Nevada, where the thermometer stands today at 90 degrees. The elevation here is nearly 4000 feet. This is new to me as I have always been used to sea level.

"This is a large town with a population of 18,000, and it is modern in every respect—plumbing, electric lights, pavements, parks, etc. We have three schools here, two grade and one high school, 15 grade teachers and 14 in high school. High school has 275 students and the grades 590. There are 15 buses, some of which come a distance of 16 miles.

"There is a large irrigation project here called the Newlands which cost about \$10,000,000 and is known as one of Uncle Sam's pet projects. Alfalfa is very abundant and the cantaloupe has just been shipped to market, on which some of the growers made from four to five thousand dollars.

"I have charge of 100 boys in manual training. The shop is well equipped with tools, power saw and other machinery. In the cooking room all the girls have a separate electric plate for cooking. There is also a large electric range for baking and roasting.

"I often think of Boardman these days and am anxious to hear from there.

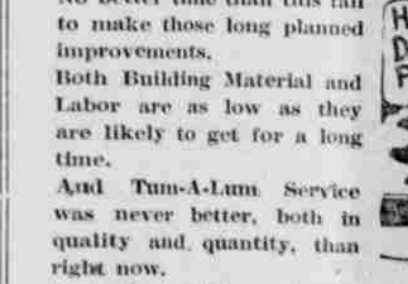
