FAILS TO PROVIDE FUNDS

Cash [Bonus Payments | Under Bonus Law Delayed by Congress.

Washington, D. C .- Failure of congress to pass the second deficiency appropriation bill, carrying among other items one for administering the bonus law, was discussed by President Coolldge and Budget Director Lord Monday at a White House conference, after which it was indicated that the action was not expected to delay ser- FARMERS' AID LOSES Will share his hopes, his dream perlously operation of the compensation

that several months must necessarily elapse before payments under the law could be started and that meantime administrative expense would be the only necessity. Favorable action on the bill in December, it was indicated after Monday's conference, would meet the situation.

Federal income taxpayers, however, who made full payments on March 15 ings from the start. will not be able to get their 25 per cent refund allowed by the new revenue law until the bill is passed. 'An appropriation of more than \$16,000,-000 to be used in making the refunds was carried in the bill.

The whole situation created by the failure of the deficiency bill was gone over at the conference, and afterwards t was said that only one provision of the bill would be carried out in full. an item for \$3,500,000 to fight the foot and mouth disease in California, Direcor Lord said funds for this were available from a surplus in the agricultural department, but that other provisions would have to wait until December.

There were no indications whatever that President Coolidge had any intention of calling a special session of congress to pass the bill, which carried appropriations of about \$198,000, 000, although Director Lord declared there was no way of obtaining the funds otherwise. The reclamation program carried in the bill was discussed by the president with Senator Borah. Senator Borah held it would be possible for the secretary of the interior to take care of settlers on the reclamation projects by postponement of forfeiture clause to meet the immediate emergency.

M.

Not only did the deficiency bill go down in defeat in the race against time, but a special resolution adopted in the last five minutes by the house to make the bonus appropriation available regardless, was lost in the senate. Republican leaders declared that only a special session of congress could provide the necessary funds for the initial costs of the compensation measure.
