Now that the incubation season is over it is well to clean the machines, spray them with sheep dip and put them away until the next hatching season. A list of the needed repairs made now may save confusion next spring when ready to order repairs. Hot water machines not completely drained are likely to rust severely while in storage, says the state college experiment station.

The soil for Oregon strawberries should have good fertility, good drainage and reasonable depth, three or four feet, say the experiment station authorities. Although strawberries are best adapted to sandy loam soil, they will grow on a wide range of soils. For commercial production the heavier soils such as "white land" and adobe should be avoided.
