CLOUDBURST HITS LEXINGTON

Property Damage Estimated Near \$10,000—Wall of Water Follows Black Horse Canyon

During a heavy storm which swept along the Columbia River on Wednesday, the town of Lexington, about 50 miles southeast of Arlington, was damaged to the extent of about \$10,000. A wall of water, six feet high, hit the town about two o'clock, after causing considerable damage to the highway and bridges in Black Horse canyon.

Morrow County experienced a heavy rain along with the rest of the wheat section and farmers throughout the county are celebrating the prospects of a record crop of grain.
