OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of the Week Collected for Our Readers.

The Crater lake season officially opened July 1.

Seven fires were reported in the Umatilla national forest during the past week.

The 36th annual convention of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association opened in Corvallis Monday.

Theodore Sprague was crushed to death under a tree in the Weise Brothers Logging Camp at Cottage Grove.

Matthew Vance celebrated his 97th birthday June 28 at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mary J. Allen at Yamhill.

George Burpette, 45, brakeman on a log train near Kerry, was killed when he fell under the wheels of the train.

At a special election in Eugene two of the measures submitted to the people carried and the third one resulted in a tie vote.

Oiling of the Mt. Hood Loop highway from the Multnomah county line to a point four miles east of Sandy is completed.

The old battleship Oregon, veteran sea eagle of the navy, was turned over officially to the state of Oregon by the navy last week.

The aphid is appearing on field peas and the vetch crop of Lincoln county. Maggot trouble is serious on cabbage and cauliflower.

Albany's sixth death from diphtheria occurred when Vincent, six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Marguren, died at the home of his parents.

In spite of the severe weather of last winter Lincoln county this year will harvest the largest crop of Evergreen blackberries ever known.

Lithia Springs hotel, financed by Ashland citizens, the new nine-story hotel which towers above all other buildings in Ashland was opened last week.

An increase over last year of 157 students at the summer session of the Oregon Agricultural college, or more than 47 per cent, is shown in registration figures.

The territory served by the Motor Transit company of Pendleton has been extended by the acquisition of stage lines operating between La Grande and Wallowa lake.

Paul Nelson, 81, was killed by a premature explosion while blasting stumps on the McMinnville Meat company's new slaughter-house site, two miles north of McMinnville.

The recent hot wave did not materially affect the fruit crop of the Rogue river valley and the quality of the valley's greatest commercial crop, pears, promises to be the best in its history.

Total moneys paid growers of all kinds of fruit raised by members of the Hood River Apple Growers' association in 1924 reached \$3,201,895, far in excess of receipts of any former year.

John M. Jones, Portland postmaster, received word from the postoffice department that 12 additional carriers had been authorized for the Portland office. They will start their duties October 1.

Announcement was made at Albany by the Linn county court that the two bridges crossing the Santiam river at Cascadia and Canyon creek on the Santiam road had been torn out and the road closed.

Royal Anne cherries have begun to arrive at the cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, and while the crop is not heavy this summer, it is expected that there will be quite a long run on this fruit.

Another fire in the Fremont national forest, now makes a total of eight in this area lying between Lapine, Fort Rock and Crescent, according to reports from the Deschutes national forest headquarters at Bend.

The remonstrance of 31 patrons was sustained and the Southern Pacific Railway company instructed to continue the maintenance of an agent and station at Alpine, in an order of the state public service commission.

One hundred and ten vessels of an aggregate tonnage of 281,224 entered the port of Portland during June. This was a substantial increase over figures for May, when 107 vessels of a total tonnage of 269,256 entered the harbor.

A slab of bacon falling from its hanging place in the Baker Packing company smoker to the fire grate started a blaze that caused damage estimated at \$500 and destroyed a ton of hams and bacon slabs at Baker.

Opened to traffic December 8, 1924, the Columbia Interstate bridge at Hood River, built at a cost of approximately \$500,000 by the Oregon Washington Bridge company, is paying the company having forwarded checks on a fractional year's dividend for 1923.

Portland probably will have air-mail service in the near future, following the call for bids by the postoffice department on eight new routes, including the Los Angeles-Seattle route and the Elko, Nevada-Pasco, Washington service.

S. L. Beck is drilling for artesian water on the John Brice place near Boardman. He recently brought in the tenth artesian well on the project for W. A. Price with a flow of three gallons per minute at a depth of 109 feet.

A new manufacturing industry, to be known as the Western Paper Converting company will probably establish a factory in Salem, with a capitalization of \$200,000, and a plant necessitating the employment of from 150 to 200 persons.

Prospects are bright at Hood River this season for an apple crop of large size and good quality. The yield is now estimated at 60 per cent of the 3,000,000-box tonnage of last year. The fruit will run considerably larger in size than last year.

Output of the 825 industrial establishments now in operation in Portland will have a value of \$216,180,000 in 1925. The annual payroll of these concerns will aggregate approximately \$40,000,000, this amount going to the 30,000 persons employed.

Perry Plymale, 13, of Bandon, is a candidate for a Carnegie medal for life-saving. Young Plymale was at his father's road camp at Hunter's creek, Curry county, and rescued a mother and her 13-year-old daughter from drowning in the stream which flows there.

Mounting to over 8,500,000 gallons, sales of gasoline in Oregon for May, 1925, more than equaled those of June last year, says a statement by Secretary of State Kozer. To date the motor vehicle fuels tax measure has brought to the state treasury the total sum of \$8,767,897.71.

With the pledging of milk from more than 250 cows in Benton county to a proposed cheese factory to be constructed by a co-operative association of dairymen at Tangent, it has been announced that the total production now necessary to insure success of one unit has been signed up.

Portland has been made the headquarters of the reorganized naturalization service district, and V. W. Tomlinson, formerly head naturalization examiner in the Portland office, has been named director. The district will include Oregon, southwestern Washington, southwestern Idaho and northern California.

When a permit for a million-dollar hotel was issued by the Portland building division the month of June surpassed all previous records, with a total of 1998 permits calling for construction totaling more than \$4,696,830. Bank clearings also were higher than for any other June record and \$24,608,625 over June of last year.

Approximately 400 sets of license plates were issued by the secretary of state's office at Salem the first day on which the half yearly license rate became effective. Many other applications have been received, but could not be filled as the applicants failed to include their certificates of title for registration, as is required under the new law which became effective July 1.

George Walker recently dug up the giant redwood tree which has lain embedded in the sands near Elk creek at Cannon Beach for years. He worked for two days with a team and scraper before he was able to move the tree. Mr. Walker estimates that he has taken nearly \$3000 worth of lumber out of the log and has cut 30 circular dining room table tops, worth approximately \$75 each.
